Ourselves

Concomitant with the termination of faithful service, acclaim vocalizes just tribute to the emeritus as he separates himself from those instrumentalities so recently allied to his responsibility. His departure from the experience evokes retrospective contemplation. Sequential events crowd fast one upon another in reflected panorama. Mental review of four years sojourn irradiates rapid flashes of transitional incidents emblazoned irrevocably upon memory and fused inextricably into consciousness. The interminable series of innovating vicissitudes in ultimate expression have welded the simple with the arduous and the pleasant with the unpleasant until the whole didactic experience reveals a creation whose least attributes are its mightiest possibilities and whose remotest achievements are its greatest incentives.

Inducted four years ago in the genial atmosphere of scholarship, awkward propers, fumbling precipitantly in circuitous response to bizarre propensities and ludicrous badinage, gently yielded to those equilibrial potions of reverence, self-knowledge, and self-control from magnanimous executants of exuberant intellect; and from them these intellectual aspirants have absorbed wisdom to balance judgment and to presage accomplishment. Accumulated efforts have been compensated with reciprocal award; assiduity to endeavor has burned obscuration away and revealed light beyond the nebulous; discipline of thought has made permanent transient aspiration; and autonomic development has subordinated superficial impetuosities and animated dormant potentialities. The categorical variations in the college career have combined to sculpture a plastic being from germinal incipiency into aureate prowess. Growth, unity, efficiency expanded the adjacent colleges into the University realm and allied aggregate strength to initiate future's illimitable enterprize. Synchronical with this emergence golden opportunity substantiates with an effulgent reverie: Mental improvement complemented by physical training amid dynamic incentives displays consummate effect to resound imperishably those happy indulgences in athletics under skillful guidance and amid unsullied memorial, in literary essay under flagrant aspiration, in forensic conflict under oratorical appeal, in dramatic endeavor under deep inspiration, in music under coalesced harmonies, in fraternal associations under lofty mutuality, and in the continuous relationship of concerted aim under scintillating experiences of admiration, respect, friendship, and love.

The departing class can only hope to proclaim appreciable expression of generous tribute to Alma Mater for this irreplaceable inculcation by symbolizing with subsequent interest and achievement.

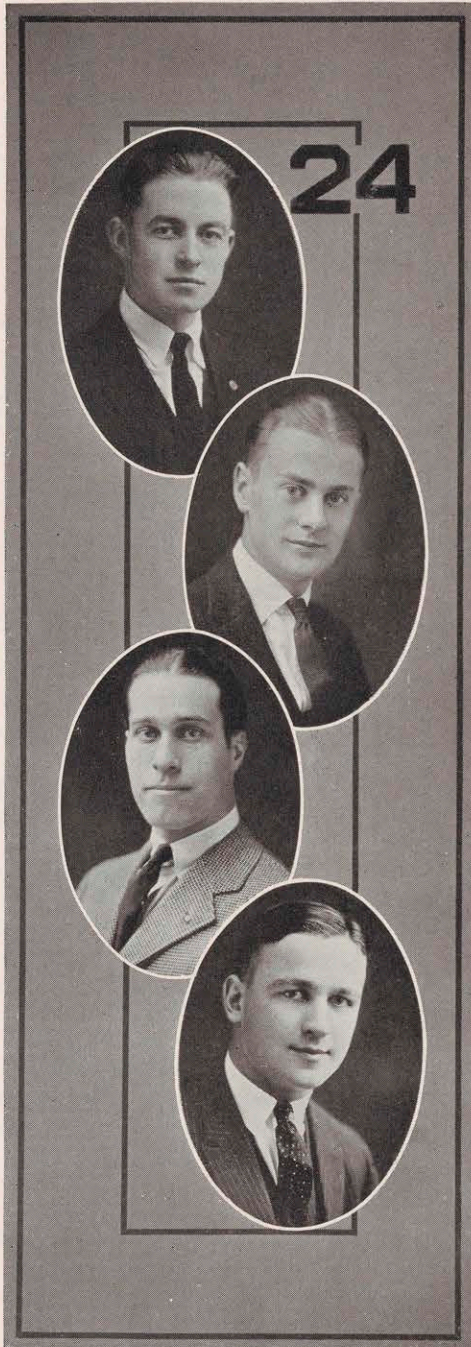
Junior Class History

Football

In September 1922 football prospects at the University of Richmond were very encouraging. With a squad of sixteen letter men, several others of last year's varsity, and a goodly number of freshmen, Coach Dobson had the material out of which to build a winning team. And he lived up to expectations, for of the nine games played only two were defeats, while six were victories, with one game ending in a scoreless tie. To cap the climax William and Mary was defeated on Thanksgiving Day by the score of 13-3.

The Spider football team of 1922 played teams from three states other than Virginia, playing both in Pennsylvania and South Carolina, and meeting the University of Maryland on Stadium Field.

IN PENNSYLVANIA

On September 30 the Spiders opened the season at Easton, Pennsylvania, tackling Lafayette College, one of the undefeated Eastern elevens of 1921. When this game was first booked it was realized that it meant almost certain defeat for the Red and Blue, but the Spiders were sure of the fact that their team would put up a plucky fight. In this respect they were not disappointed, for although defeated, 33-0, the Southern team pushed their opponents to the utmost. Unable to gain but little ground themselves the Spiders forced Lafayette to work for every inch they gained.

STRONG LINE

It was in the second game of the season that the Spider line proved its ability to hold. In Maryland the University of Richmond met a much heavier team, but throughout the game the Spiders prevented the visitors from scoring. Towards the latter part of the game Maryland advanced the ball to the Spiders' three-yard line, but here they met a stonewall and were unable to penetrate further. Likewise Maryland prevented the Red and Blue from scoring and the second game of the season ended in a scoreless tie.

WON AND LOST

On October 14 Fate prevented the Red and Blue eleven from triumphing over the University of Virginia eleven to the tune of 6-0. After continually breaking through the Old Dominion defense the Spiders scored a touchdown in the second quarter of the game. The try for point after touchdown failed and the Spiders were leading Virginia, 6-0. Such was the score at the end of the first half. At the end of the third quarter the Red and Blue were still leading Virginia by the same margin. It was only in the last few minutes of play that, by a break of the game, Virginia managed to take the lead. In the last five minutes of play Virginia recovered a fumble and scored a touchdown. Before the Spiders were able to reorganize another touchdown had been scored. Then the Red and Blue came back strong and were carrying the ball down the field when the whistle blew, ending the game with the score, 14-6, in favor of Virginia.

A ROW OF VICTORIES

After the first three games of the season, which resulted in two defeats and one tie the Spiders annexed one victory after another. In the game with

Roanoke, which resulted in a 6-0 victory for the Red and Blue, the Spiders did not perform up to par. But the next week they hit their stride. After a journey to South Carolina the Red and Blue tackled Furman University, for three years undisputed champions of the Palmetto State. Here the University of Richmond defeated Furman 13-0, seven of the points being accounted for by Zeigler's toe. Not only did they win a victory but also the appellation of "Blue Devils". Following the Furman game Randolph-Macon was downed on Stadium Field by the score of 43-13. Although the Jackets scored two touchdowns they were unable to earn a single first down, being given one on a technicality. On Armistice Day the Spiders piled up the largest score of the season by defeating Lynchburg College at Lynchburg, 45-0. Then came Hampden-Sidney. Remembering their 7-5 defeat of last year the Spiders were out for revenge, and revenge they got. As a result the Tigers went home defeated, 34-0.

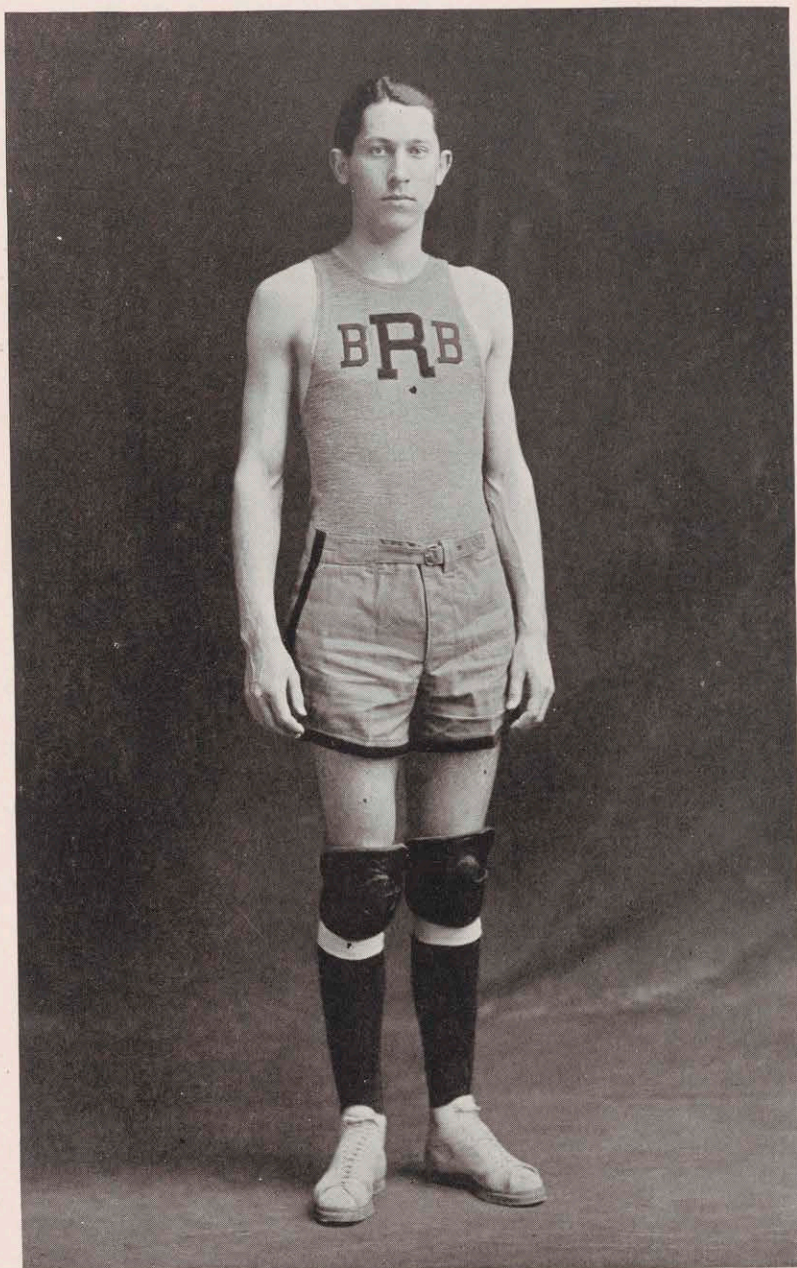
But all this was only leading up to the real game of the season, that with William and Mary on Thanksgiving Day. Both teams were primed for the occasion and had a good previous record. The Red and Blue entered the game with the dope a little in their favor. For the first time in years William and Mary was the first to draw blood, scoring a field goal in the first period. Undaunted the Spiders continued driving, but nevertheless the first half ended with the score 3-0 in favor of the Indians. In the second half the Red and Blue came back strong and scored two touchdowns. Zeigler's toe added the extra point. When the final whistle blew the Spiders had won, 13-3, and thus ended the 1922 Red and Blue football season.

A SUCCESSFUL SEASON

Judging the season as a whole the Spiders have no mean record. With only two defeats, one tie, and six victories the Red and Blue have accomplished something of which to be justly proud. In Lafayette the Spiders met one of the strongest teams in the State of Pennsylvania and this State is not usually in the habit of turning out poor teams. In Maryland, a much heavier team was encountered and the Spiders were able to hold their own. Virginia won by a freak of luck, after being outplayed for over three quarters. The remaining games resulted in Spider victories. Thus it seems evident that the Spiders have the right to boast of their 1922 team.

HARD FUTURE

While the 1922 schedule was hard the schedule next season promises to be just as hard. The Spiders will again meet the University of Maryland and Furman University. Maryland will be sure to put up a strong fight while Furman will try to get revenge for the 13-0 defeat of the past season. Rutgers has been substituted for Lafayette and comes in the middle of the season, which is certainly a compliment to the Spider team. The season is scheduled to open with the University of Virginia at Charlottesville, and here again the Spiders will have a chance to do what they came so near doing this year—defeat Virginia. The old Red and Blue rivals will be encountered as usual and will be determined to defeat the Spiders if possible. In order to prevent defeats it will be necessary to have many new first class prep and high school athletes to fill the vacancies left by the graduating men.

Bottom row—Miller, guard; Bethel, guard; Carlton (captain), center; Zeigler, forward; Fray, forward

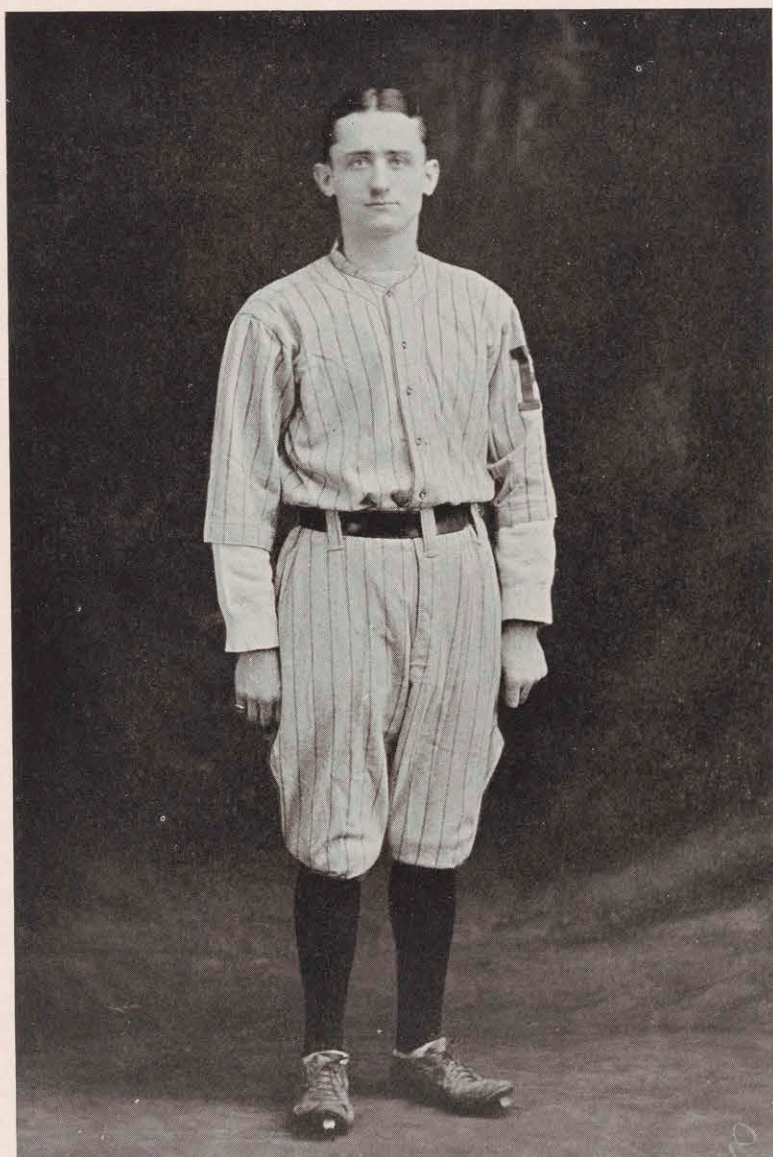
Basketball

Judging the season as a whole the basketball record of the University of Richmond in 1923 was good. Nine out of the thirteen games resulted in victories for the Spiders, while four encounters ended in defeats.

The basketball season opened with four letter men reporting for practice. Dave Miller stepped into "Red" Allen's shoes and the Red and Blue varsity was complete. With Zeigler and Fray as forwards, the Spiders had a very fast working pair. Captain Carlton could be relied upon for good work at center. Opponents of the Red and Blue found that Miller and Bethel presented an air tight defense as guards. With this array of men and with Rigsby, Marchetti and Whitehurst acting as substitutes the Spiders enter the season.

Bridgewater College annexed the first game of the year, and incidentally the first game ever played in the Millhiser gymnasium. Against their next two opponents the Spiders had little trouble, easily winning from both Randolph-Macon and the Richmond Blues by comfortable margins. Following the game with the Yellow Jackets, the Red and Blue quint encountered the William and Mary team in the Millhiser gymnasium. The Indians were no match for the Spiders and the U. of R. quint was able to double the score. The University of Virginia and Lynchburg College next appeared on the Spider program, both games being played away from home. In the game with the Old Dobinion, the Spiders outplayed the Virginia team during the final period, but were unable to overcome the lead established by the Orange and Blue in the first half. Lynchburg fell before the Spiders in one of the hardest games of the year, the score being tied on six occasions. After the game with the Hornets, the Union Theological Seminary quint was easily defeated. The University of Florida game resulted in a victory for the Spiders by a one point margin. Hampden-Sidney added another victory to the Red and Blue string. Although outplaying Trinity during the first period, the Spiders were unable to maintain their lead and lost to the Carolina quint, 30-22. In the second game of the season with Lynchburg, the U. of R. team got off to a bad start but managed to win by the margin of a field goal. The Hornets had scored twelve points before the Spiders registered, but coming back strong in the latter part of the first period and during the final half the Red and Blue won by the score of 29-27. Randolph-Macon was next defeated without much trouble. The Indians, who had already been defeated by the Spiders, were next encountered. But it was a much stronger team that closed the season for the Indians than the one defeated earlier in the season 31-15, and the Spiders were forced to bow in defeat. The game with William and Mary brought the season to a close; a season which had resulted in nine victories and four defeats.

But it is not fitting to close without a work of mention concerning the freshmen team. Coach Dobson, at one time, remarked that the freshman quint was the best turned out at the University of Richmond in a number of years.

Baseball

On May 17, William and Mary defeated the University of Richmond baseball team at Williamsburg by the score of 8-4 and brought to a close the 1922 Spider baseball season. Even though the Red and Blue was defeated on three occasions by the Indians, the season taken as a whole was a success. Of the seventeen games played, ten resulted in victories, while seven were defeats. The highlight of the season proved to be the 4-1 victory over the University of Virginia, it being the first time that the Spiders have defeated the Old Dominion on the diamond since 1897.

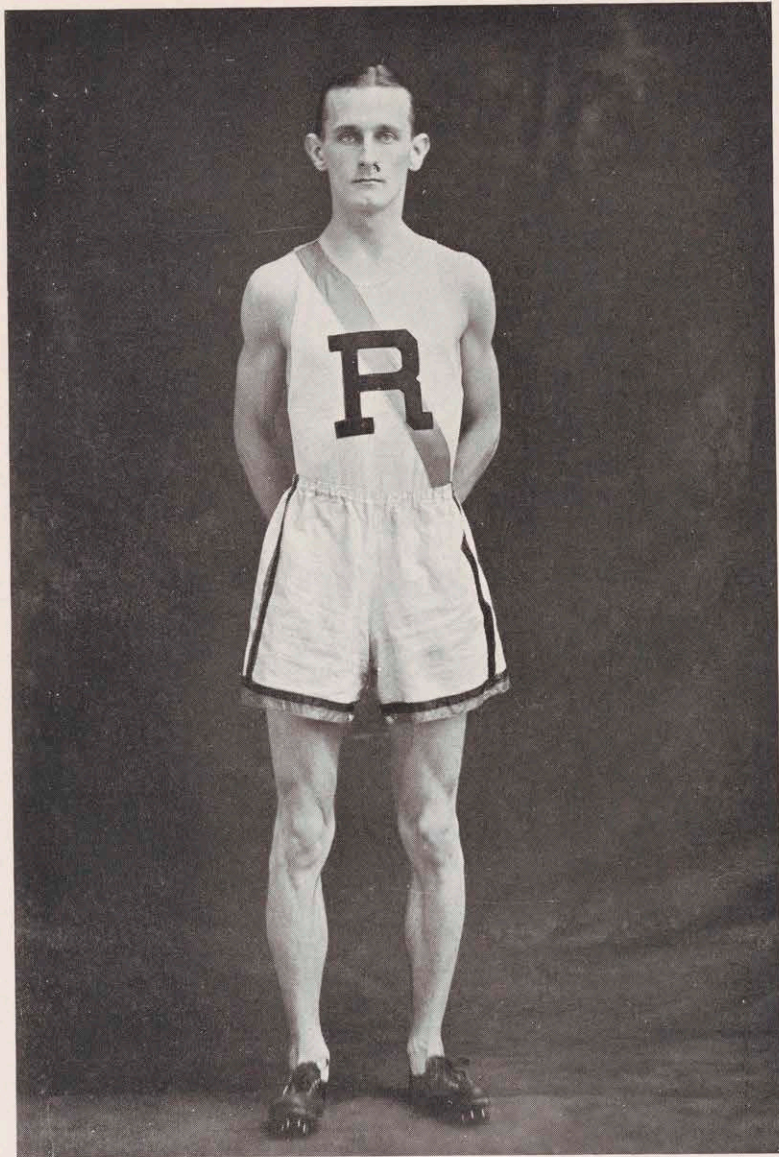
The team opened the season at Stadium Field on March 29 by defeating the Union Theological Seminary by a score of 13-5. Shortly afterwards Delaware College was downed in a close 2-1 game. The first team to defeat the Spiders proved to be the Richmond Colts, who won 9-6. On the first trip the Red and Blue defeated Randolph-Macon at Ashland by the count of 7-2. This was the first time in three years that the Spiders have been able to defeat the Yellow Jackets on foreign territory.

After the Randolph-Macon game the Spiders took on Lafayette College and this game turned out to be the "heart breaker" of the season. Getting a heavy lead in the first inning the Spiders entered the ninth with the score standing 10-4 in their favor. The ninth inning proved unlucky to the Red and Blue and very lucky to the visitors. Lafayette staged a wonderful ninth inning rally and nine men had crossed the plate before the Spiders were able to stop the onslaught. When the Spiders came to bat they were unable to hit and the game ended 13-4 in favor of Lafayette.

Then followed two consecutive defeats at the hands of William and Mary. The first game, at Newport News, resulted in a 4-2 defeat and the second at Norfolk 7-5. But after such rough sledding the Spiders hit smooth work. First Oglethorpe fell, 9-4, Trinity College won, 8-6. Next came the University of Virginia at Charlottesville. Here the Spiders defeated the Virginia team 4-1, probably reaching the highest point of success in their 1922 schedule. Following the Virginia game Hampden-Sidney was downed 10-4.

After the Hampden-Sidney game the Spiders entered the last lap of the season with six games still to be played. In the next six games the University of Richmond broke even, winning three and losing three. The first game in May resulted in a 2-1 defeat at the hands of Wake Forest College. Two days later Emory and Henry downed the University of Richmond 4-2 on Stadium field. On May 11 and 12 the Spiders defeated the Hampden-Sidney Tigers in two games, the score of the first game being 6-2 while the latter resulted 5-3. Randolph-Macon next fell by the score of 5-0.

Then in the final game of the season William and Mary defeated the University of Richmond at Williamsburg by the score of 8-4. While this was not a very glorious ending from the Spider standpoint, the season as a whole must be considered successful.

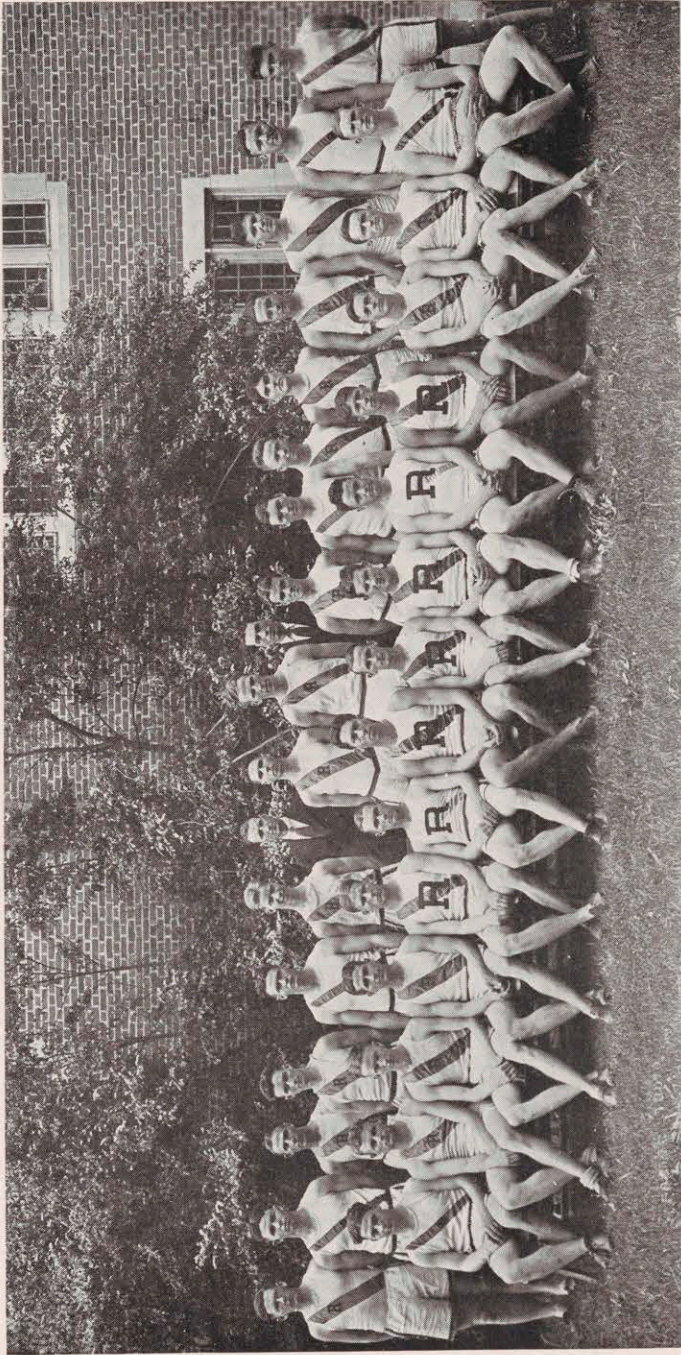

Track and Field

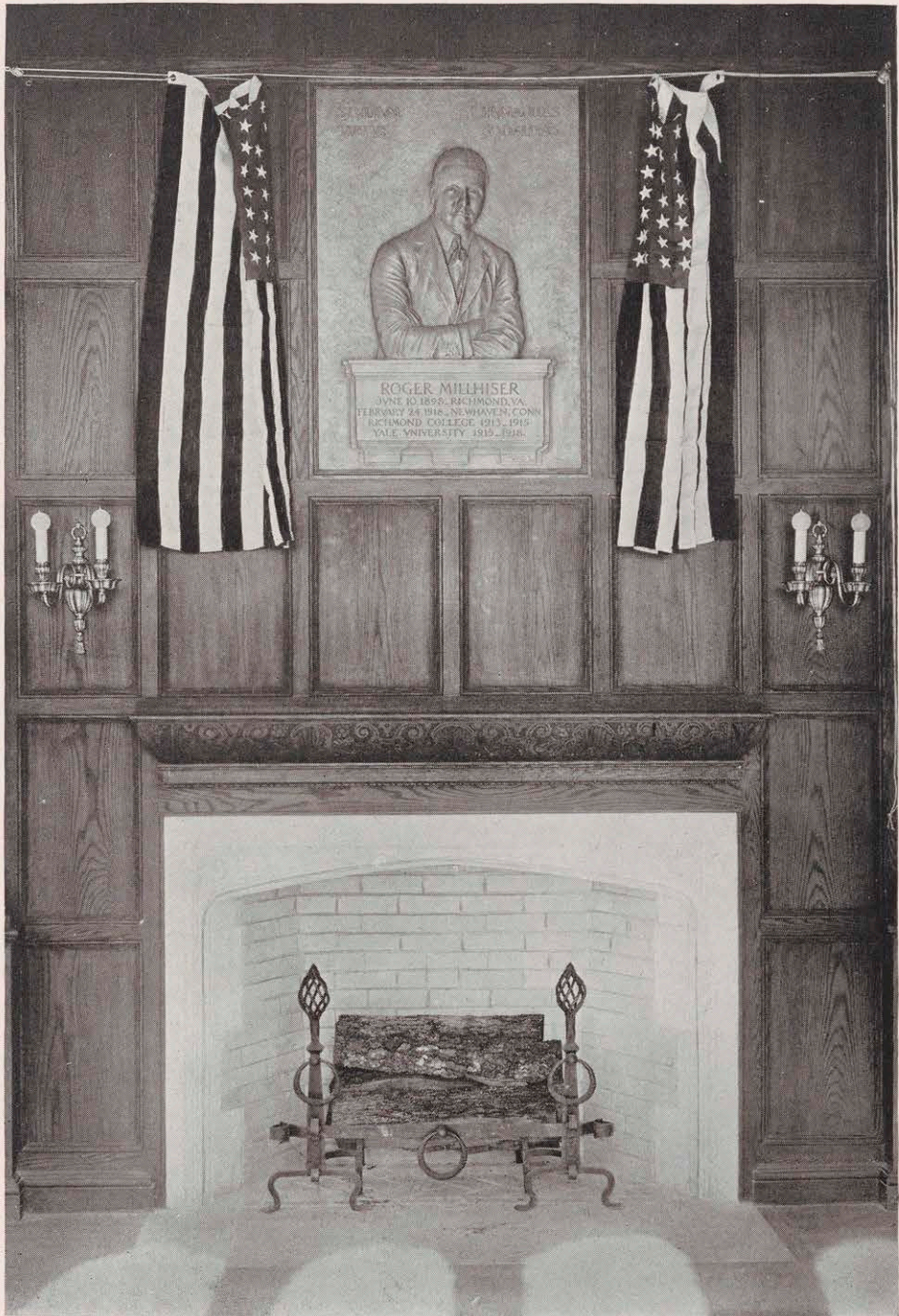
The University of Richmond is one of the few small colleges of the South to have such a high standard of Track and Field work. At the University of Richmond it is one of the four major sports and ranks on an equal level with the other three. Since 1914 the Red and Blue has never been defeated on the cinder path by a track team turned out by a school of its size. This indeed is a record of which to be proud.

But the track standing of the University of Richmond is not due to individual superiority. This was clearly shown in the dual meet between William and Mary and the University of Richmond, in which the Indians walked away with all but four of the first places and were still defeated. One of the chief factors in the developing of the Red and Blue track material is the system of compulsory freshmen training, which has unearthed latent material. Without this system the Spiders could not even hope to remain on such a high rating.

In 1922 the Spiders tackled a very hard track program, due in part to the inability to arrange meets with schools of its size. Both the dual meets with Washington and Lee and V. M. I. resulted in defeats by large scores. In the American Legion Meet held at Washington, D. C., the wearers of the Red and Blue took two places, which is indeed worthy of mention when one considers the large number of entrants. In the South Atlantics held at Charlottesville, Virginia, and won by Georgetown, the Spiders managed to take one place. This was the fastest South Atlantic Meet ever held, seven of the fourteen records being smashed.

In the dual meet with William and Mary the University of Richmond was able to beat the Indians by the score of 66-60, even though the Indians won ten of the first places. This in itself shows that the Spiders have a well-balanced team and is not dependent on individual stars. Among schools of its size the Spiders rank pre-eminently in Track and Field.

One of the chief compliments paid to the University of Richmond along the line of track and field was the awarding of the 1923 South Atlantics to the University. Equipped with wonderful athletic facilities, a more appropriate place could hardly be found south of Philadelphia for the holding of such a meet. It is safe to say that never before has a school of the size of the University of Richmond entertained such a huge affair. This certainly seems to indicate that track at the Spider institution is on a sound footing and promises to grow with each succeeding year.

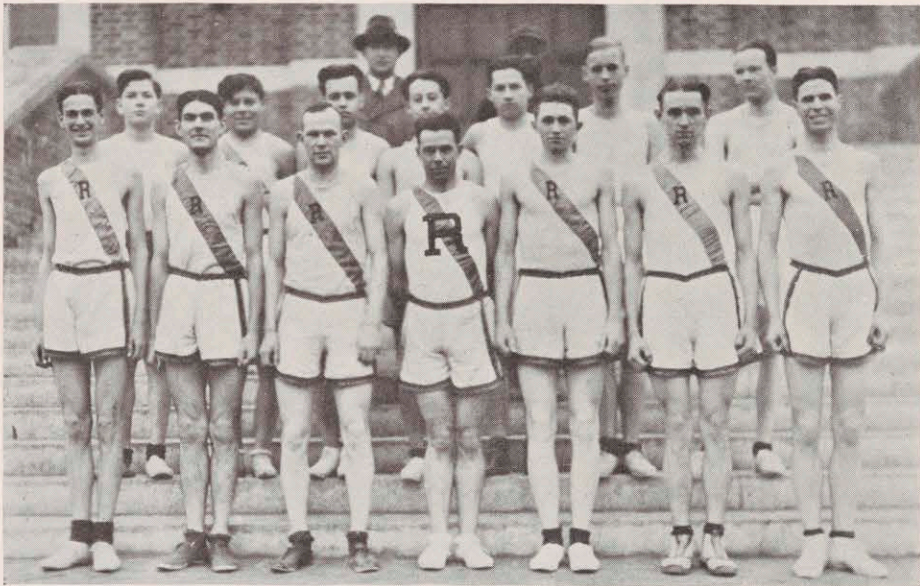
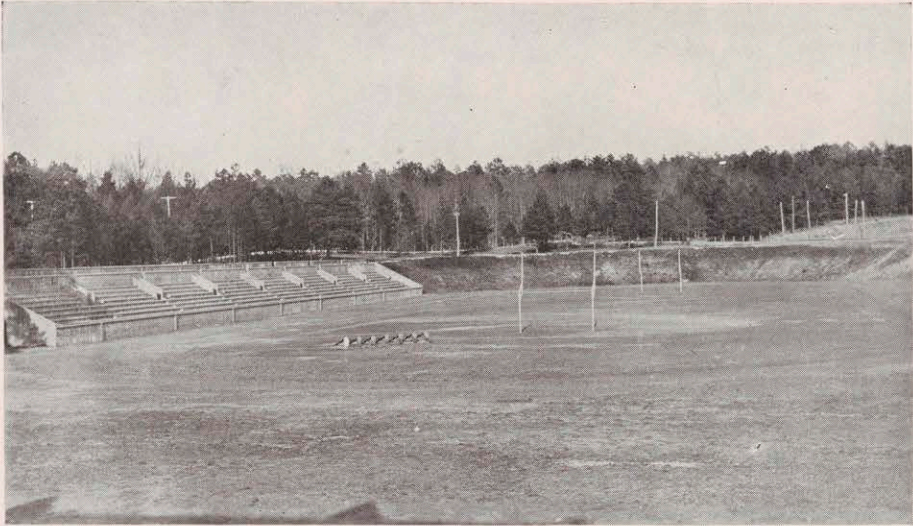

FRESHMAN BASKETBALL TEAM

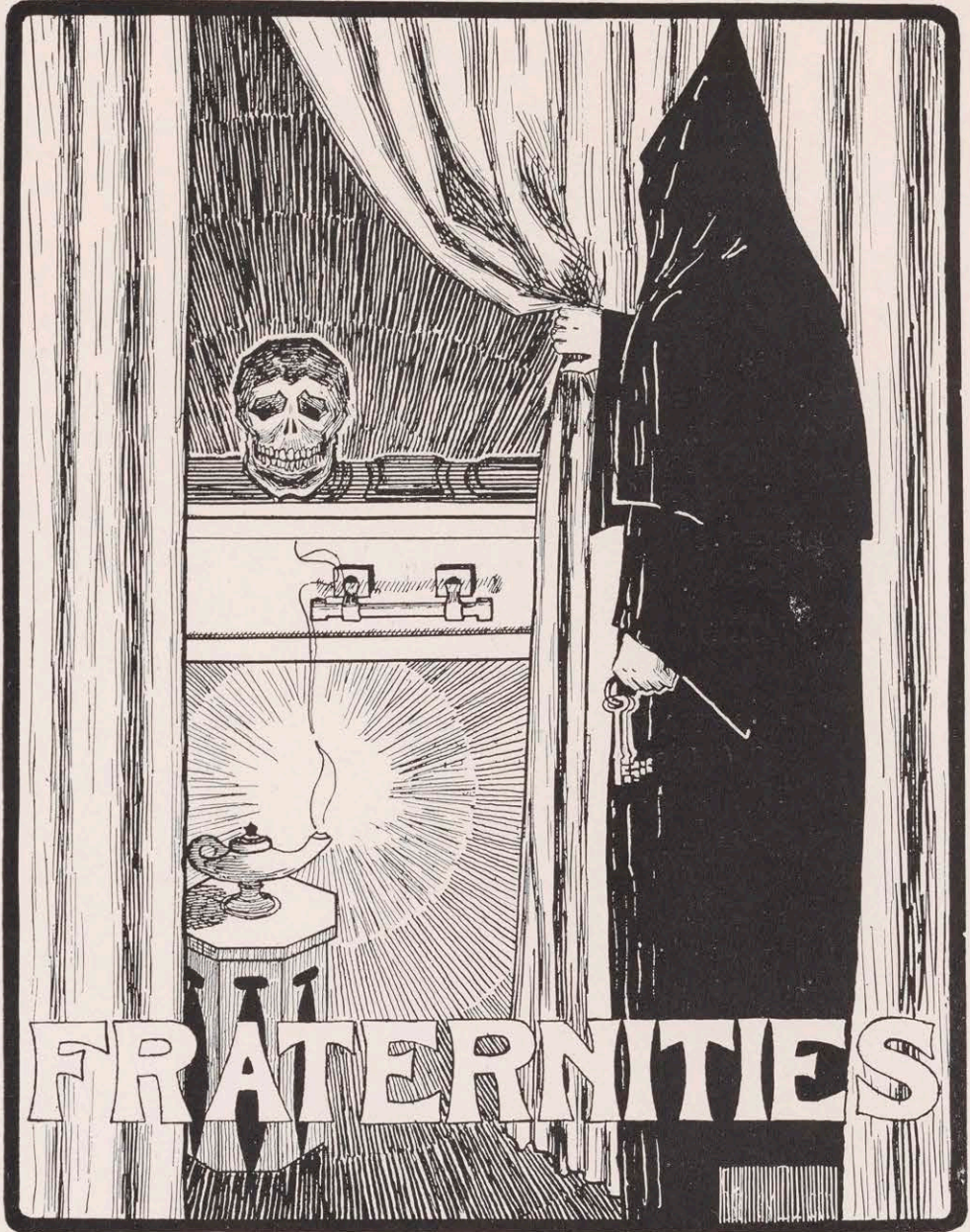
Top row—Dobson (Coach), Lloyd, Chaffin (Manager)

Pi Alpha means Pente Alpha, five prizes, or excelling in five fields, Scholarship, Religious and Social Activities, Class Activities, and the two A's, Athletics and Art, which is a generic term including music, painting, dramatic and literary ability. Pi Alpha is primarily a society for seniors who have broad interests and are sincere in their love for the college and willing to exert themselves to keep its ideals alive.





The dreams of 1913-14 have today become realities to us all. In that year the buildings for our new college at Westhampton were in the process of construction, and every loyal heart was stirred by thoughts of what the future held in store for us. The new institution would include a college for men and a college for women co-ordinate with the college for men.

Many changes were anticipated in the old regime. Among the plans was a movement inaugurated by the students for the establishment of a scholarship society which would correspond in its purpose to that of the Phi Beta Kappa. The movement was led by Alvah B. Hovey then a sophomore. After consultation with Phi Beta Kappa members of the faculty, Mr. Hovey drew up a petition which was signed by the students. As a result of this, the present Society of Arachnidae was organized by the faculty.

The Arachnidae takes its name from the college emblem, Araxons, being the Greek word for Spider. As stated in the constitution its object is to encourage and reward scholarship in Richmond College and Westhampton College. Election in each college shall be by the faculty of that college from a list of eligibles submitted by a committee to be appointed by the dean from the Arachnidae members of that faculty. The number shall not be greater than one for every six or major fraction thereof in the roll of the senior class. Students and alumni are eligible to membership provided they have made on all work counted for the B. A. or B. S. degrees an average of ninety per cent or over, that they hold an academic degree, and have a good moral character. All members of either faculty, who are members of Phi Beta Kappa, shall be honorary members of the Arachnidae.

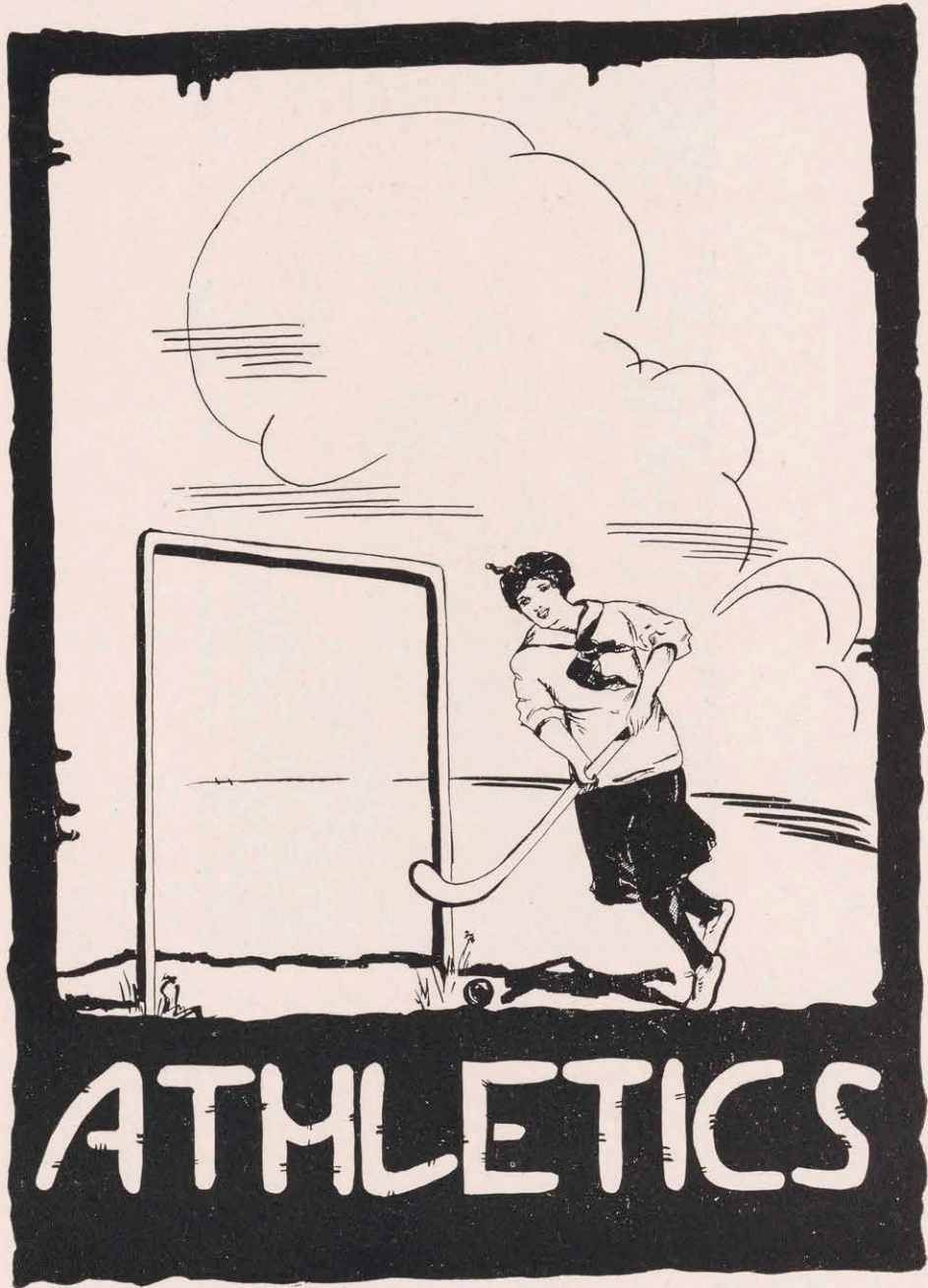

HOCKEY

Taking all in all Westhampton feels that she has emerged from the seasons of 1922-23 with a very successful athletic career. One of the events in this year's record at Westhampton is unprecedented. For the first time a field hockey team from Richmond entered a national competition and held its own with the Boston team, the score ending in a tie. These teams played under the auspices of the National Tournament of the Field Hockey Association, which was held at Philadelphia in November. Westhampton emerged with a 6 to 3 victory over Sweet Briar which resulted in the defeat of the team for two successive years.

BASKETBALL

In the basketball world Westhampton captured second place among the "Triple Entente", composed of William and Mary, Westhampton, and Sweet Briar. Of the five Varsity games played three resulted in victories. During the season Westhampton scored a total of 209 points against the 132 of their opponents.

The first game of the season was with the City Normal in which Westhampton won by the one-sided score of 85 to 19. The Federal Reserve Bank team won their defeat on the Westhampton floor to the tune of 38 to 14. With these two victories they entered the game with the Richmond Y. W. C. A., only to emerge defeated, the score being 29 to 24. Journeying to Williamsburg for the next game, the Spider sextet again met with misfortune, losing to their deadly rivals in a very hard fought game by the score of 24 to 21. But undaunted by two defeats the Westhampton team obtained sweet revenge for the 25 to 24 defeat of last year by beating Sweet Briar 41 to 36. This, the most important game, ended the season.

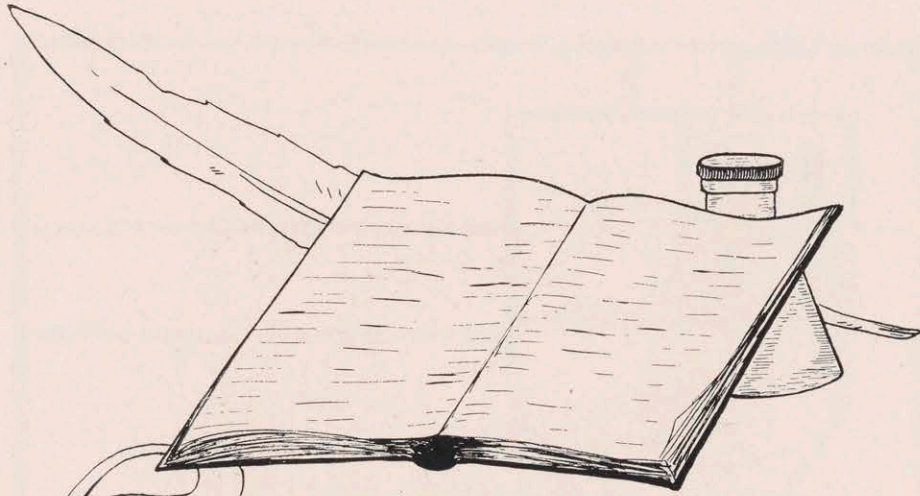
In closing, it is also our hope that you who have approached this book of memories, have found therein something of the beauty, the life, the sacred traditions and customs, and the spirit of Westhampton.

History of the T. C. Williams School of Law

Every great institution is wont to look with pride upon its history of achievement. It is not a vain glory in thus priding ourselves upon the accomplishments of the past, for in them we see, as in a mirror, visions of the future. There was no history, there was no past, when in the year 1870, the Trustees of Richmond College conceived the idea of rendering greater service to young manhood by the addition of a law department to the College curriculum. That idea developed to reality and the T. C. Williams School of Law stands today as a memorial to the deep interest and untiring efforts of those honorable men who composed the Board of Trustees in that year, when Richmond College itself was but in its infancy. In this connection this sketch would be incomplete without mention of the name of John Alfred Jones, a member of that distinguished body and a prominent attorney of the Richmond Bar, who was chairman of the committee upon whose recommendation the law department was established. This committee also submitted the names of William Green and James D. Halyburton as Professors of Law, and suggested that Dr. J. L. M. Curry, then a member of the academic faculty, be invited to teach Constitutional and International Law. The report and recommendations of the Committee were adopted and in the fall of 1870, the Law School of Richmond College opened its doors. Thirteen students enrolled in the first class, upon eight of whom was conferred the degree of Bachelor of Laws in the following year.

To many of us who know the T. C. Williams School of Law as it is today, the thought never comes to us that in its early years its very existence more than once hung in the balances of uncertainty. Coming at a time when difficulties had in the year 1890 necessitated a discontinuance of the law classes, was the announcement of a substantial endowment from the family of the late Mr. T. C. Williams, who prior to his recent death had for many years been a member of the Board of Trustees. About the same time Mrs. Harriet M. Purcell donated to the law department the large and extensive law library of her brother, the late Senator Henry Heaton, of Loudoun County.

Since the year 1891, the Law School has operated continuously, each year marking additional improvements in its curriculum and equipment, until today, historic old "Columbia Hall," around which the early days of Richmond College and many delightful traditions of the past are centered, houses a law school modern in every respect and boasting a faculty of seven competent and successful members of the Virginia Bar, devoted to their task of imparting the highest and best in the theory, practice and ethics of an honorable profession to the approximately one hundred and fifty students now enrolled.

We would that space permitted us to dwell on the reminiscences of the past, but so much for the past—so much for the lessons of the past—the question that confronts us is, what is the future of the T. C. Williams School of Law? The vision that comes before us is one of continued growth and usefulness—a standard institution offering an environment from which its student body grasp the enthusiasm of him who seeks to know the spirit of the law as well as its letter, and who would go out into the world not baffled by the magnitude and complexities of life, but as one who under the steadying process of law and order shall see truth and justice as the one great standard and applied justice between man and man as the chief end and consummation.

We felt that in addition to creating something for the benefit of the members we could also commemorate the name of a great man who had labored unceasingly through unsullied achievement to vindicate the fair name of Virginia. Hence on the first day of November, 1922, the Thomas Nelson Page Literary Society was organized. Being a new class, it cannot be expected of us to depict anything startling since we have been associated. Our experience has been more conspicuous as an acquaintance period preparatory to the great future before us than a creative period. We have learned, however, the fundamental value of co-operation. We have individually and collectively endeavored to achieve the end which best points to the advancement of the school and class as a whole; and we have aspired to set concrete precedents for those who will succeed us.

Since access to great benefits has been unhesitatingly opened to us during our sojourn here, we gratefully submit an appreciative comment to commemorate our sentiments of love and affection for the school.

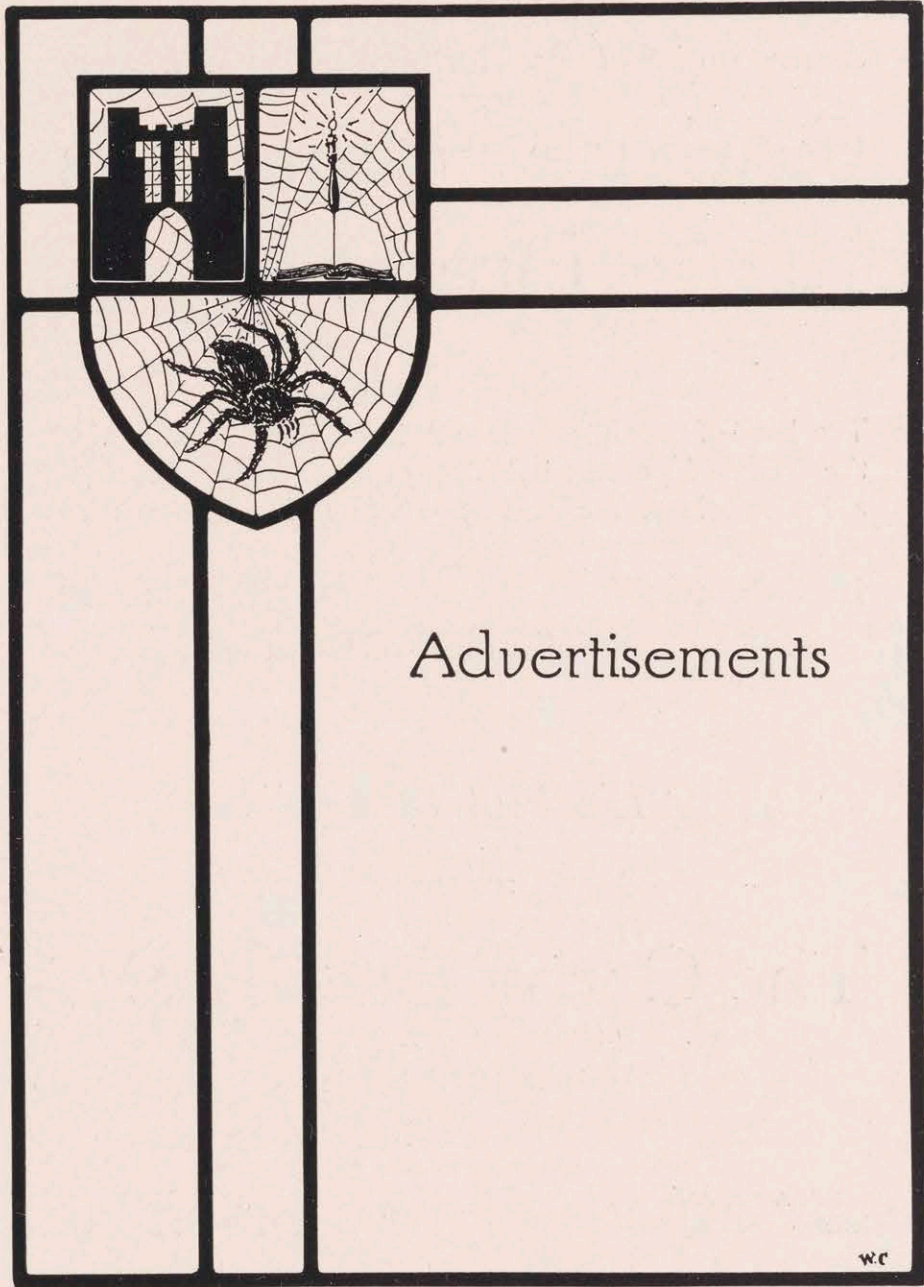


Dramatic Club

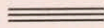

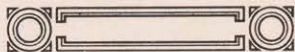
