Hand in hand we cross the threshold, lending courage and a kindly word to the one by our side.

One road leads to wealth, but we can see what the travelers of that road cannot see—that the gold is all brass; another road leads to fame, but we see the pitfalls and the unhappy faces at the end of the road. There are other roads, but they are all marked **WRONG**. Then from our position of knowledge and power we can see the *Right* road bathed in soft sunlight with here and there cooling streams that glisten silvery in the sunshine. We look at one another and understand. Everyone sees what is best in his life. We slowly release the grasp on one another's hand and reluctantly we say goodbye. May we ever keep on memory's wall the beautiful pictures of the versatile class of nineteen hundred and twenty-four of the University of Richmond.

Football

After the years of plenty the lean years fall upon us and in football Coach Dobson faced this year the problem of building up his machine after the loss of so many letter men and the lack of suitable line material. From the point of view of victories the season cannot truly be said to have been highly successful with only three slight victories in a season of eight games.

As a matter of fact, the team scored fewer points than any eleven turned out by the present Spider athletic director during his many years here. Rutgers, one of the strongest elevens encountered in an ordinary season, was taken on in New Brunswick during the season by an eleven composed of all freshmen except Captain Bethel—with the result that the Spiders were defeated by the score of 53 to 0.

Good material, particularly for the backfield, was encountered among this year's crop of Freshman aspirants, but the same problem of building up after the graduation of a strong eleven consumed a large part of the time of Coaches Dobson and Miller during the season. Efforts are frankly being made toward another more powerful machine for 1925—this being due to experience in the past which indicates that two Freshman classes strong athletically are not to be expected in two successive years. The loss of eighteen letter men in only two years makes it absolutely necessary that the work of rebuilding be started early as the team next fall must of necessity be made almost entirely of Sophomores and Freshmen with two or three men experienced under the Dobson system.

It is not to be contended that the showing of the team in the games this year was not creditable, all things considered. In the first game of the season at Charlottesville, a team composed largely of Freshmen playing their first game of college football, held Virginia except for Benny Arnold's unerring toe and a consequent 9-0 score.

Maryland, with one of the strongest teams in its history, victor over Pennsylvania and others, was the next adversary, and, although the Spiders battled well, about three-fourths of the time—particularly Captain Bethel—they were defeated.

The first victory was over the Lynchburg College Hornets by the score of 7 to 6, the game not being particularly creditable in that Richmond played a rather ragged game and the Lynchburg tally seemed to be more a result of Spider misplays than Hornet efficiency. If the phrase "moral victory" is still in use the Hill City eleven is a candidate for the honor.

Furman's "purple hurricane," reduced last year to a breeze, blew down Stadium Field largely by means of Captain Carter's end-around-end dashes, with the result that they avenged defeat in South Carolina with a 22 to 7 win here.

Randolph-Macon Yellow Jackets seem to always fight hard regardless of any apparent odds against them. They made their annual journey to Stadium Field after the Furman game and played the Spiders to a standstill much of the time, only to lose by two touchdowns.

More tough fighting was encountered when the whole of Hampden-Sidney came down for the Tiger-Spider encounter and saw the boys from Death Valley narrowly avoid victory. Richmond had a little edge in ground gaining and seemed to have the game, despite Ben Smith and other things, but in the last few minutes a series of forward passes, amazing either because they were lucky or because the Tiger ends were marvels, threatened to take the game. It ended, however, with another of the rather unsatisfactory 7-6 victories for the Dobson clan.

William and Mary apparently chose one of the Spiders' lean years to turn out a particularly powerful aggregation of gridiron heroes and with the approach of the annual Turkey Day battle with its alumni homecoming and other features, the dope gave the Indians a slight lead. Predictions seemed to be justified up to the last part of the game, the Richmond and Williamsburg elevens battling valiantly amid the usual cheers and excitement. In the third quarter William and Mary got off a pass which looked like a work of Providence and from then on they progressed merrily onward to 27 points and had one of their few tastes of victory on the gridiron at the expense of the Spiders. Up to the last period the game was good, with the Indians indicating the lead they doubtless deserved, but the last few minutes were tragedy for the Spiders.

Curt Fray, considered the Spiders' best bet as a halfback, was out of the last three games, and his experience in working with the Dobson plays was undoubtedly missed by a team relatively inexperienced. Savory, Rees, McCorkle, Steinmiller, did some good work in the backfield, however, while Mahaney played one of the halves creditably in many of the games.

Captain Bethel, Rucker, Ratcliffe, Johnson, Booker, Grigg and Mahaney have played their last game on the gridiron for the Spiders and their work was in general excellent. Captain Bethel's work drew comment of opposing coaches, even in games when the Spiders were fighting against odds. Although as a machine, the Red and Blue was not as powerful as the season before, Ralph's work in center still showed to advantage, as did the experience of the few veterans show in the execution of the famous shift plays.

Dave Miller, playing his second year, acted as field general and his work as a quarterback improved with experience, indicating the probability of continued improvement, particularly when considered with last year's Freshman material and prospects for the coming year.

All the Freshmen did unusually well, considering their lack of experience, and their seems little doubt of rapid improvement in football fortunes at the University of Richmond, beginning with improvement expected next fall to reach another high peak the year following.

Admirable spirit was shown by the team throughout the season in face of defeats following a remarkably successful preceding season, and no fears are held generally for the continued progress of Red and Blue elevens.

Basketball

With only three letter men back to start the season, prospects for the year were considered far from bright, so that the development of a winning quint by Coach Dobson came as a mild surprise at first, until a season which rated the Spiders second among Virginia teams was completed.

Miller and Bethel were back in line to provide powerful defensive guards as a nucleus and form the quint with Captain Fray to be counted upon as an active offensive factor. DeMotte, Fagan and Bell came from among the rats and along with Sanford and several others did their best to fill up the gaps with the result indicated in statistics given below.

The Spiders won 14 of their 19 games, dropping games to Virginia, Washington and Lee and Maryland, and winning only one each of two-game series with Lynchburg College and William and Mary. On the first game of a four-day trip Richmond dropped a game in which 57 personal fouls were called to the Indians in Williamsburg by three points, retaliating in the return game in the Millhiser gymnasium by a decisive victory.

The Spiders won from the Hornets in Lynchburg with comparative ease after losing to the Generals and Virginia, but the Hill City quint next came to Richmond and won their second varsity contest from the Red and Blue by getting off to a whirlwind start and holding to their narrow margin to the last of the contest.

Many of the contests were won by close scores, but many others were cinched from the beginning. At Ashland this year the Yellow Jackets did not get a single goal from their own floor, but improved in play on the return game. The Tigers succumbed with comparative ease both at Death Valley and Richmond.

Maryland won a listless game by two points, both teams being decidedly off in their play, to judge from performances both before and afterward.

One of the prettiest games of the season was the Spiders' 41 to 17 victory over Roanoke, but for sheer excitement and spirit the second Indian contest Washington's birthday included material for a tradition.

Basketball was in general a decided success. For one thing, interest in the court game was greater with interfraternity games attracting much attention on the Campus. The Freshmen also turned out a strong quint and played a good season.

Dave Miller was second to Captain Horace Hicks of the Indians in the highest individual score for Virginia teams. Other statistics on the Old Dominion quints, as prepared by Bill Christian, of the Richmond News-Leader, follow:

Baseball

Although five Freshmen had to be developed by Coach Dobson for last year's nine, the Spiders managed to come through a fairly heavy schedule very creditably.

Virginia and Washington and Lee were numbered among the defeated teams while an even break was secured with William and Mary, the Indians winning at Williamsburg and the Spiders at Stadium Field, both scores 11-7, the mystic numbers. Even V. M. I. with Frank Page, the pitching ace, barely got a 3-0 victory in Lexington.

With mound material used up on the trip, Lynchburg college administered a 14 to 6 defeat to the Spiders in a slugfest staged at the Hill City fair grounds. Later in the season, however, Richmond retaliated on the Stadium diamond with a 16 to 4 victory, batting Lefty Thomas, Hornet mainstay, out of the box.

Maryland and Fordham, two of the best college teams available, opened the season here by defeating the Spiders. The games were well played, however, and held interest. Randolph-Macon was easily disposed of in two games while the speedy Wake Forest aggregation, with a brace of pitchers extraordinary spent two days here and won a game a day. The season closed with a victory over Oak Ridge, another Carolina team.

Hobbie Snead closed his career on the diamond here with some of the best work of his career and Sam Creath was considered a find among the Freshmen, his work on the mound giving great promise for future development.

Dave Miller, Walden, A. Creath, Ashby Cook, also Freshmen, showed up unusually well by the end of the season while Curt Fray and Jones, shortstop and second, hit well and played the same good brand of ball which characterized former seasons.

It was a year of building up, but it is not believed to have been in vain as early practice, started before spring examinations and continued through the holidays, indicated hopeful prospects for the nineteen games scheduled.

Henry Johnson, Hobbie and Creath, the moundsmen, alternated in the outfield and their work there was unusually good. For this spring only Waverly Jones, Snead and Patterson will be missing from the squad and an unusual amount of material is available to fill in the blanks.

Snead, Fray and Jones came through the season in the 400 class with several of the other members of the squad hitting well up for college circles.

The Richmond Colts were the only team to trounce the Spiders completely, Dawson's team knocking the ball all over Mayo Island for a 13 to 0 victory. Outside professional ball, however, the season was highly satisfactory, in the opinion of Spider supporters who expect more success in victories this spring.

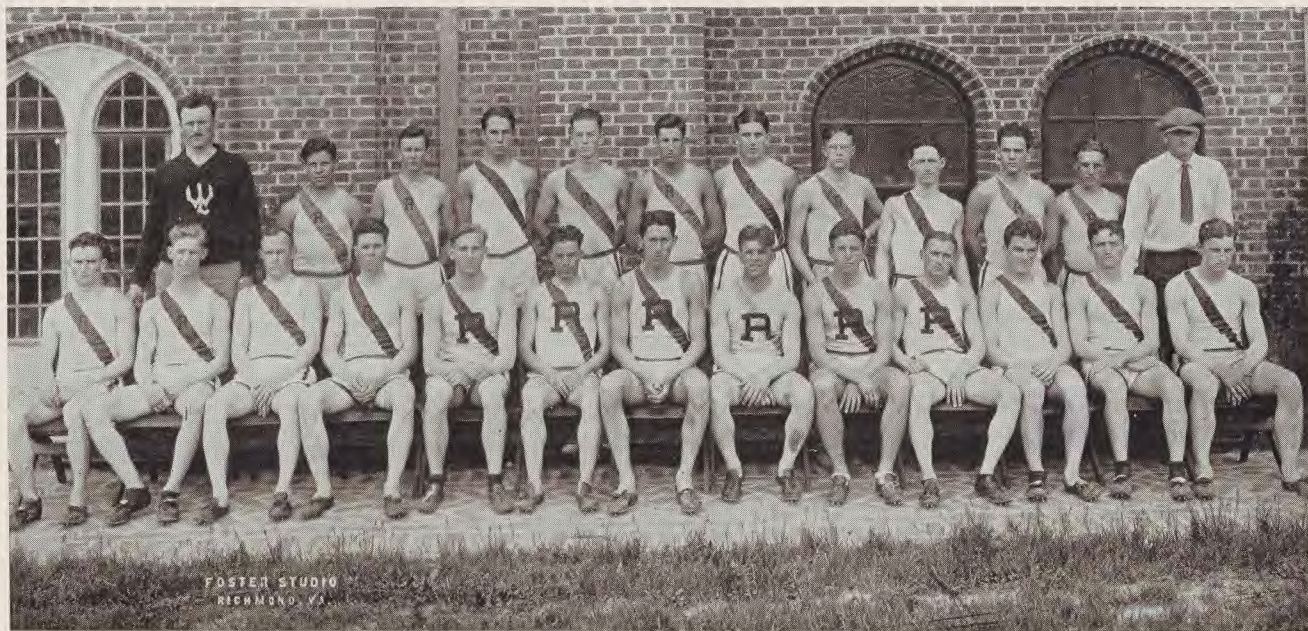

Track and Field

University of Richmond maintained its high standing in track and field athletics last spring and added stimulus to interest in the cinder path pastimes generally by very successfully staging the annual South Atlantic games on Stadium Field. Coach Dobson has spent much time on track work among the Spiders with the result that since 1914 the Red and Blue has never been defeated by a track team from any school of its approximate size.

Last spring saw the easy defeat of Roanoke College, the Spiders taking virtually all the first and second places and, what is more, the William and Mary Indians came out at the short end of a 66 to 60 point score. This success indicates the efficiency of the training system starting with compulsory training for Freshmen by which any latent talent is unearthed, as evidenced by the fact that Richmond has gradually worked ahead of virtually all of the smaller southern schools in track and field.

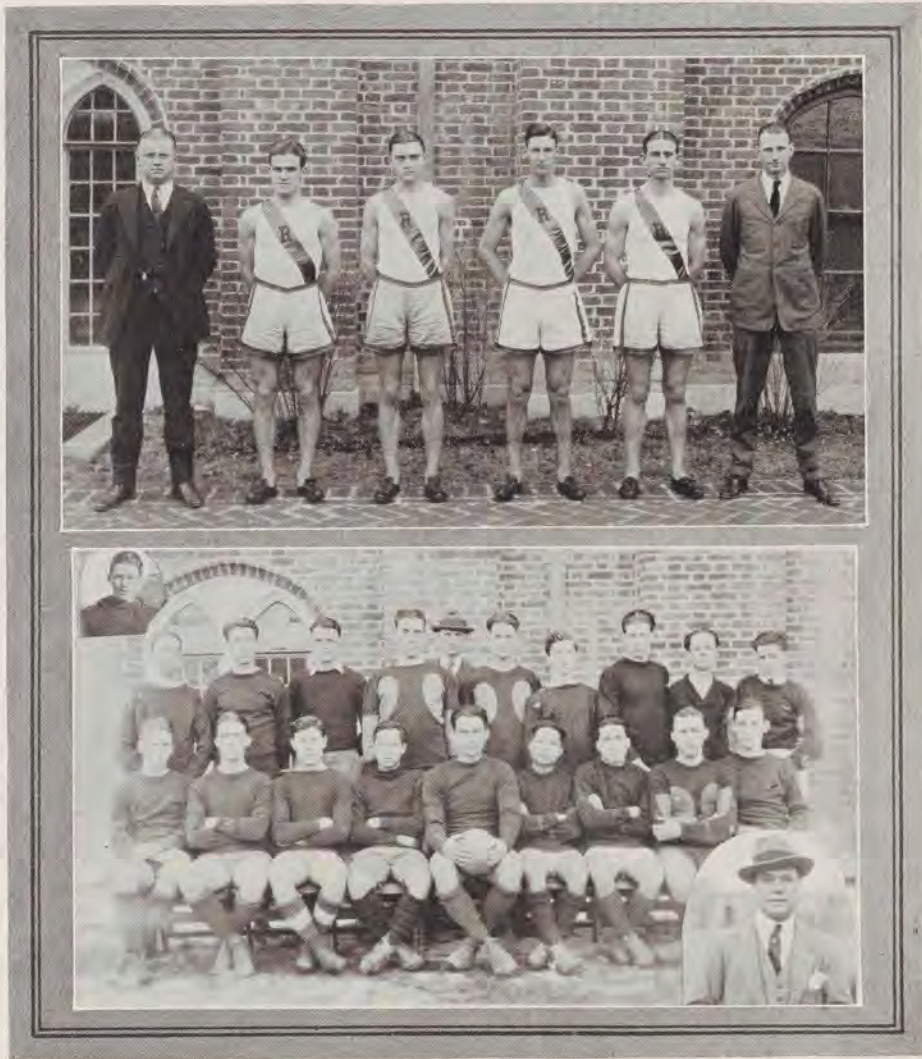
The contention that the geographical location of Richmond and the unusually complete athletic facilities at the University of Richmond make this the most appropriate place in this section for a meet like the South Atlantic, was borne out by the success of the games last year. It is expected that either by reorganization of the S. A. or by other organization the same schools will compete here this spring, as the various coaches expressed themselves as well pleased with the facilities offered at the last meet—the first of the kind ever held here.

An even more successful season was expected at the time this volume was going to press and the success of the relay team as well as Freshman prospects seemed to bear out the hope.

Track, as a sport, is placed on absolute equality with football and other major sports and with the basis already indicated, steady improvement is hoped for by the alumni, students and coaches who have watched the general scheme of development of the institution.

Last year saw the first use of the new Roger Millhiser Memorial gymnasium and with equipment being constantly added and more prep school material attracted by the added prestige of the institution, continued improvement is expected in the status of the Spider cinder path artists.

Existing college records were smashed easily during the year. Tom Dekle cut down the two-mile record by ten seconds; Harrison Rucker lowered the high hurdle record and established one in the low hurdle event. H. L. Arthur increased the javeline throw by eight feet while Rucker and John Tatum both cleared the bar in the high jump at 5:8½, increasing Rucker's former record.

Indoor Track, Cross Country and Soccer

What have been formerly known as minor sports have been greatly stimulated this year and in addition soccer has been successfully introduced into the University of Richmond—the first school in the state to turn out a team in the sport.

As South Atlantic college champions the indoor relay team has featured the season, winning three out of three races, defeating William and Mary and George Washington twice each and University of Maryland once. The college record in the mile relay was broken twice. Rucker, Bloxom, Edwards and Tharpe first shattered the 1912 record of 3:39 by tearing off the distance in 3 minutes 37 $\frac{1}{2}$ seconds at the Georgetown meet at Washington and two nights later, Bloxom, Goode, Edwards and Tharpe cut down the time to 3:35 in the Johns-Hopkins meet at Baltimore. In this meet also Tharpe ran well in the open half mile and Dekle in the distance event against a field including eastern eastern champions.

In conjunction with the Richmond Blues the first meet of the season was won easily by the Spiders at the Blues' armory in Richmond, the meet, which Coach Dobson hopes to make an annual affair, attracting many prep school entries for the secondary events. The affair attracted considerable interest and seems assured for a place in the Richmond sport calendar.

As a reward for their good work this year, Coach Dobson took the whole squad to the Washington meet. Captain Rucker, Ratcliffe, Dekle and the relay team also going to Baltimore where they performed creditably.

In the Evening Ditpatch cross country race in the fall, Captain Tom Dekle, Tharpe and Hillis Miller placed fourth, fifth and sixth in competition with entries from all over the state, giving promise of even greater improvement next season. Other Spider entries all finished the race.

Largely through the efforts of K. A. Pate and the help of the Chinese students who played the game at home, association football was during the winter established at the University, the Spider soccerites getting off to a big start by defeating the Richmond association footballers at Byrd park in the first game they ever played. Coach Dobson has encouraged the sport on equality with others and a regulation field with goals has been laid off and used between the stadium and the Millhiser gymnasium. The interest attracted this year seems enough to insure its permanency as a sport, and many students have already played in the games between the Red and Blue teams formed for practice purposes.

Assistant Coach Miller has been carrying out the compulsory athletic program of the university and during the winter, Freshmen have been put through various kinds of track work partly in an effort to develop talent.

This year has opened up new avenues for advance in athletics generally and a feeling of optimism for future Spider teams pervades the campus.

HOCKEY

Sweet Briar and Westhampton met on Sweet Briar's field for their annual game. Westhampton soon gained a three point lead and at the end of the first half the score was 3-1 in her favor. Sweet Briar, however, came back with renewed force and vigor. The excellent playing of Sweet Briar's team was characterized by its good stick work and its accurate passing. Though the Spiders were unable to keep the lead which they made in the first half, they played a hard fought game throughout. Sweet Briar emerged with a score of 6-3.

BASKETBALL

Westhampton moved from second to first place in state intercollegiate basketball. She has played winning ball throughout the season, being victorious in all five games.

The first game of the season was a victory on the home court over a team not heretofore on the schedule, George Washington University. This score, 34-13, started Westhampton off with a rush. The next victim was the fast team of the local Y. W. C. A., for some time friendly, but keen, rivals. The resulting score of this game was 33-30 for the Spiders. The following week they met the Federal Reserve Bank team on the Richmond Y. W. court and defeated them with a score of 44-18. The Spider sextet underwent strenuous practice for the next week in preparation for the last two, yet most important, games. William and Mary journeyed to Richmond to uphold their 1923 record, but returned defeated by four points, the score being 21-17. This was the roughest, hardest fought game of the season, although not for once did the Spiderettes give in to Sweet Briar. Urged on by previous victories and cheered and backed by the entire student body, Westhampton, fighting from start to finish, again triumphed over Sweet Briar by a score of 28-19. This ended the victorious season for Westhampton.

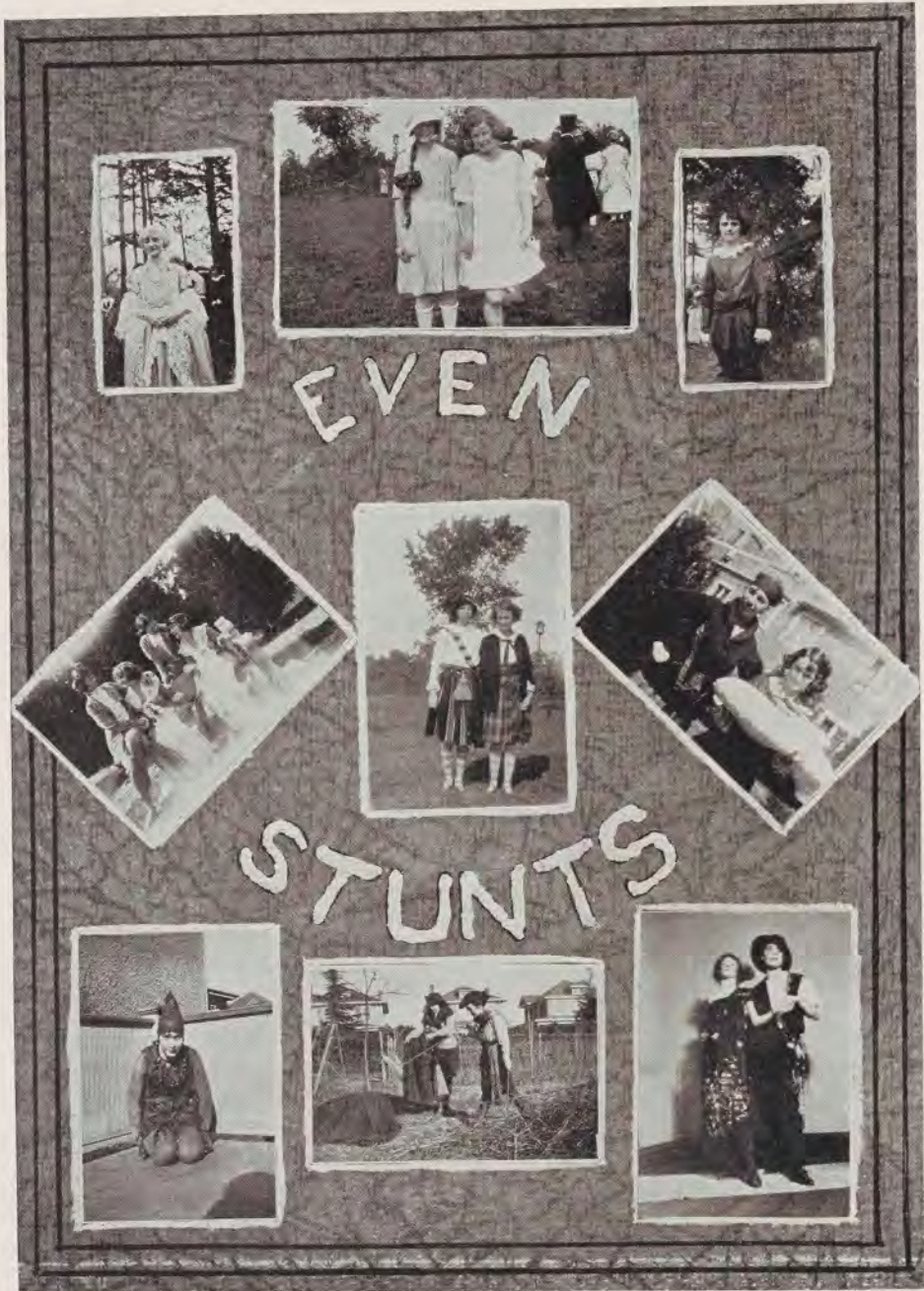

But Mrs. Grove got up, you know, and let the revelers in.



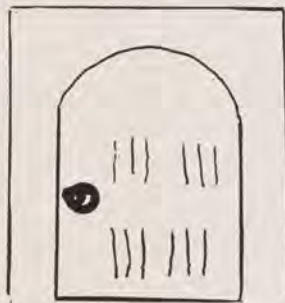
The Woman's Building
