We have been her true and loyal sons while students and no matter where we may go we will never betray her nor forsake her. She will always occupy a very tender spot in the inmost depths of our hearts.

Let us now look with the other face of Janus towards the future. We have done our best in the past; but the brightness of the future overshadows everything that we have accomplished heretofore. As we look into the futures of our classmates we see physicians, leading in the discoveries of medicine; we see lawyers governing the governmental policies of our state and nation; we see musicians bringing joys into the lives of thousands; we see business men directing the economic policies of our country; we see teachers placing young men and women in possession of their social inheritance; and, we see ministers helping the needy and proclaiming the Word of God with all boldness, bringing peace, joy, and eternal blessedness to millions of souls.

As a parting word—our university has reflected much honor in permitting us to be students here for four years. May we as we go out into the world bring greater honor, glory and praise to the illustrious name of our Alma Mater.

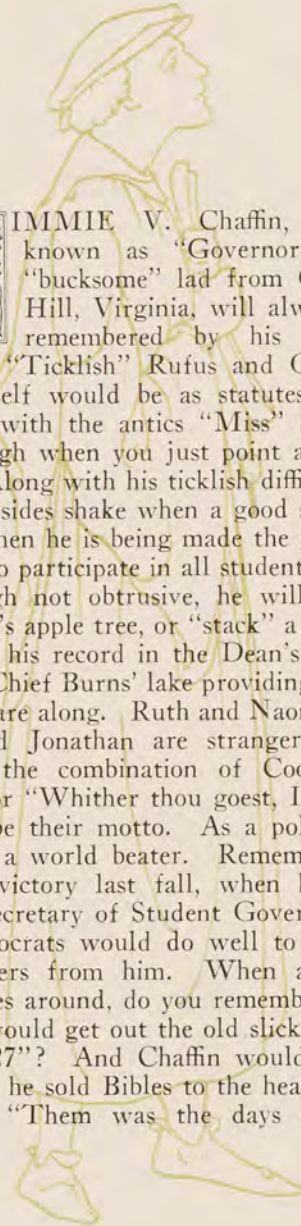


"GOVERNOR"

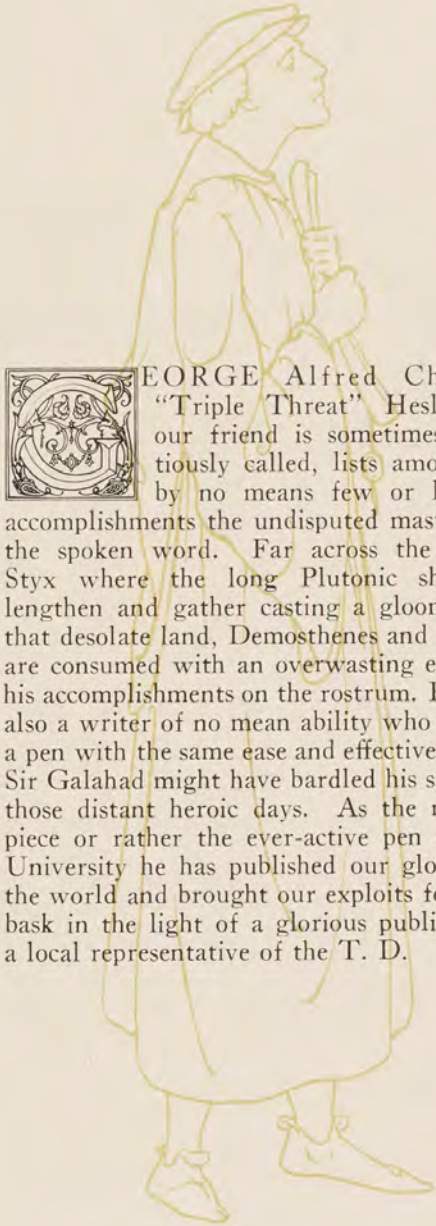
HOPE long deferred is often sweet in realization if you care to dally in the realms of philosophy. Harry came to Richmond College four years ago unheralded and unsung.

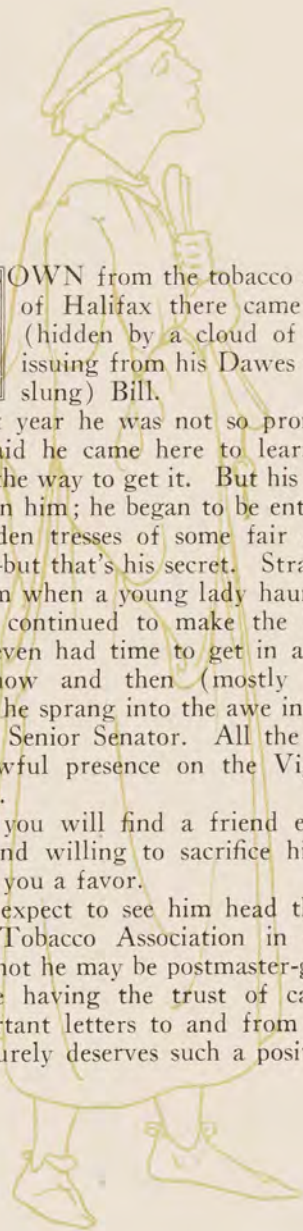


DOWN from the tobacco section of Halifax there came to us (hidden by a cloud of smoke issuing from his Dawes underslung) Bill.

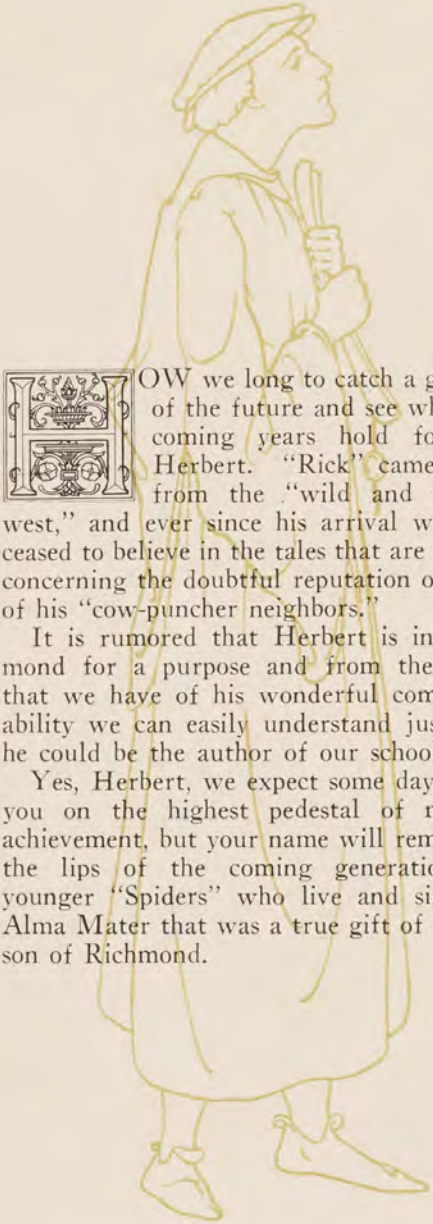


WHAT a piece of work is man! how noble in reason! how infinite in faculties!

Freshman Class History

The opening day of the 1925 session of the University of Richmond, September 17, 1924, marked the dawning of a new era in the lives of approximately 175 young men, who having assembled from all parts of the globe, were subjected for the first time to the long and tiresome process of college matriculation. To all it was a day which had been looked forward to with keen anticipation and interest.

As soon as the class schedules were made out and all matriculation fees paid, these boys became honest to goodness "Rats" and from then on were treated accordingly by the upperclassmen.

To many of us the process of assimilating the so-called "Campus Etiquette" was a strenuous and not altogether pleasant one. There were many of us who persisted in leaving off the prefix "Rat" and the suffix "Sir" to our names, while others were slow to realize the necessity of giving the time honored R-A-T caps the right-of-way over the other styles of head gear, while on the campus.

Then came the "Rat Parade" on the final initiation of the freshmen into the realms of Spiderdom. Without a doubt this was the outstanding event of the history of the Rat class during the fall semester and according to many, the greatest celebration of its kind ever staged by a class of the University of Richmond. Bedecked in gaily colored costumes of every description, camouflaged behind coatings of paint of every imaginable color, and displaying banners and signs which bore verses particularly suitable for the occasion, the entire Rat class, accompanied by the upperclassmen in general and the Sophs in particular, boarded two special cars at the conclusion of classes on the afternoon of October 5 and journeyed into Richmond, where a monstrous parade was staged to the delight of thousands of people who lined the street to get a glimpse of the exhibition.

Led by the Spider Band and two dilapidated Fords, in which rode the officers of the Student Government Association, the parade pushed its way down Broad Street for eight blocks and at last came to a halt in the Capitol Square, directly in front of the Capitol Building. Governor E. Lee Trinkle and Attorney General Saunders, who were among the 5000 spectators, gave short addresses while several unfortunate rats were made to perform individually much to their embarrassment.

The initial indulgence of many of the freshmen in politics came with the election of rat officers, which in many respects rivaled the national presidential campaign which was being carried on about the same time.

Another colorful event of the fall term was a delightful reception tendered the freshman classes of Westhampton and Richmond Colleges by President F. W. Boatwright.

Plans are being formed at the time of this writing for the annual Rat Banquet which in all probability will be held during the earlier part of the winter term. This also gives indication of being a memorial event.

In all student activities, the Rat class of 1924, in spite of its age handicap, has been unusually represented. In the literary societies, on the staffs of the college publications and on the athletic field, the class has furnished a wealth of material.

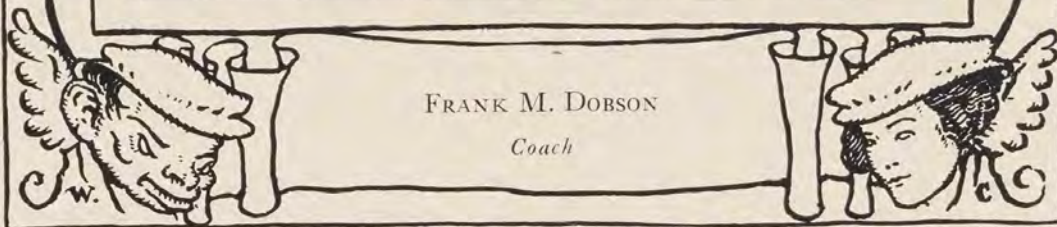

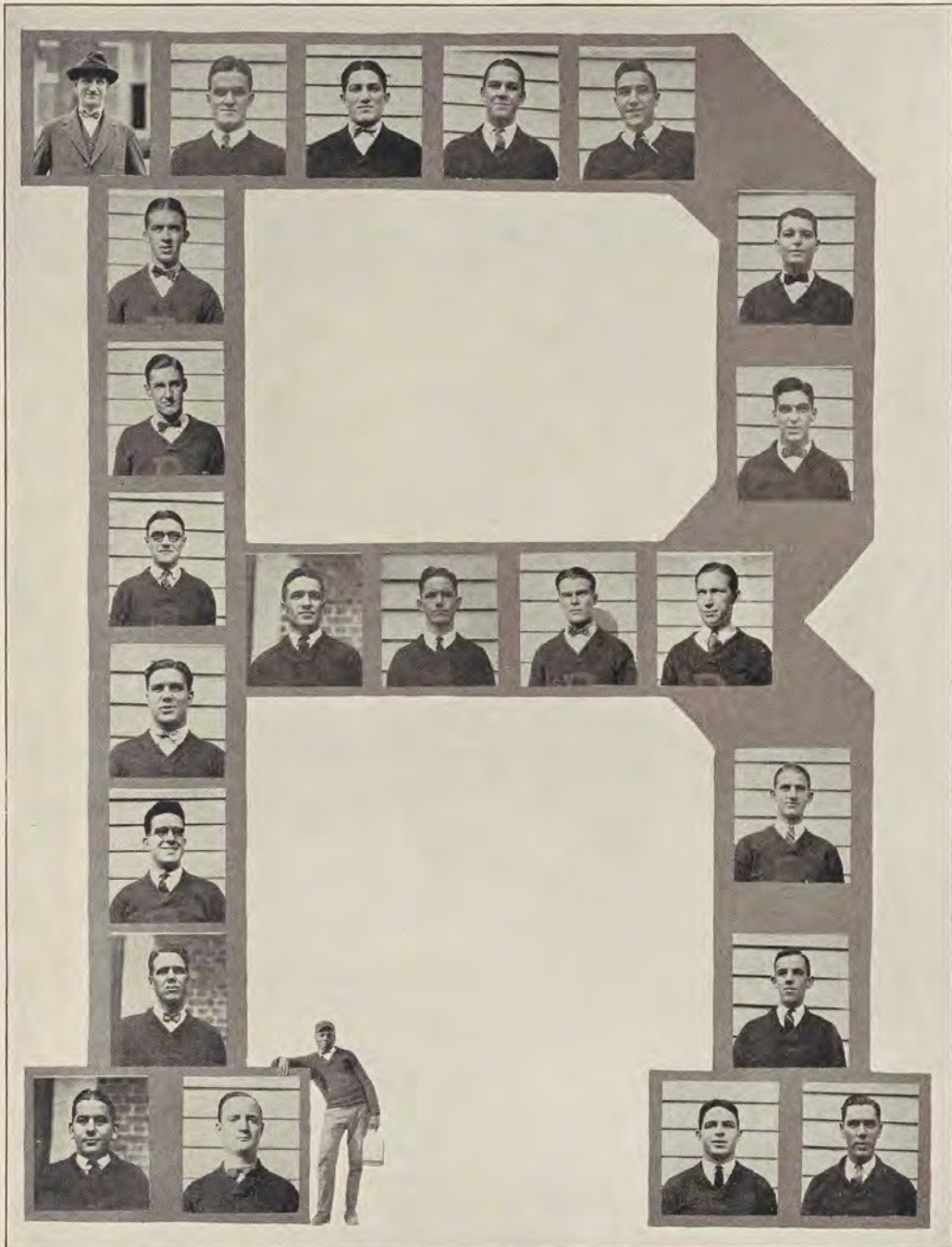

Football 1924

Looking back over the past two seasons at first glance we would immediately classify them as most unsuccessful—and from the standpoint of games won and lost, no other opinion could be accepted. But after careful consideration we can easily sum up some very good reasons for these lean years and in addition see many bright spots which give us a feeling of optimism for 1925 and particularly 1926. Of course, we must expect to lose a few men. Nevertheless, prospects can be called the brightest since 1922.

The team was undoubtedly the least experienced that U. of R. has ever had and with the forced retirement of Captain Reams in late October, not a single linesman with more than one year's experience was left. Even with this, only William and Mary of the teams in our class, scored more than one touchdown. In the six games among the colleges, the varsity won two, tied one and lost three. The contests with the larger Southern Conference members resulted in victories for the big fellows by the largest margins previously recorded.

Let us now turn to the redeeming feature of the unimpressive record. With Captain Reams' retirement every man on the squad was playing either his first or second year. Only four men had earned a letter—DeMotte, tackle; Miller, quarterback; Savory and McCorkle, halfbacks. The rest of the squad was made up of substitutes of the 1923 team and freshmen. Of the old men, Miller at quarterback, Minter, center, and Sanford, left end, made the most progress—closely followed by Savory at right half. Dave Miller, captain elect, came forward so fast that we should find in him as capable a quarterback as Wicker, Pitt or Jones, although it is unlikely that he will ever carry the ball as well as the latter two. L. Minter's work at center stood out in every game. His passing was almost perfect and his defensive work eclipsed that of any of his opponents except Todd of William and Mary. Sanford showed constant improvement. His ability to catch passes, especially in the pinch, resulted in two touchdowns. His defensive work on the line of scrimmage was high class. Lack of speed hurt his down field work in which department he was accorded such excellent support by Goode that this short coming was hardly noticeable. Savory improved his running game considerably. His shifty tactics and ability to take advantage of quick openings put him past the line of scrimmage often. If he possessed more speed his offensive effectiveness would be doubled. Defensively he has much to acquire. All of the others left over from 1923 showed some improvement—some of which was spasmodic as in the case of Dillon and Vitsky. McCorkle suffered an injury in the middle of the season that prevented him from doing himself justice. Gibson, DeMotte, Hood, Parker, Pate and Goode should all show to greater advantage in 1925 because of their added experience. Newcomb showed wonderful improvement in his play at halfback and should be even better in 1925.

The freshmen presented some excellent material although limited in numbers. Sharpe at left half and Witten at left guard proved to be the outstanding players at

tackle and end, showed considerable promise. These men together with Peterson, Sibold and Bank can all be counted upon to render valuable service in 1925.

After thus considering the past two seasons one can see that the future looks very bright indeed. Much good material has been uncovered which should reach its acme in 1925 and '26. The schedule for 1925 is hard, but the prospects are much more encouraging than they have been since 1922. Football should be successful for the University of Richmond for 1925.

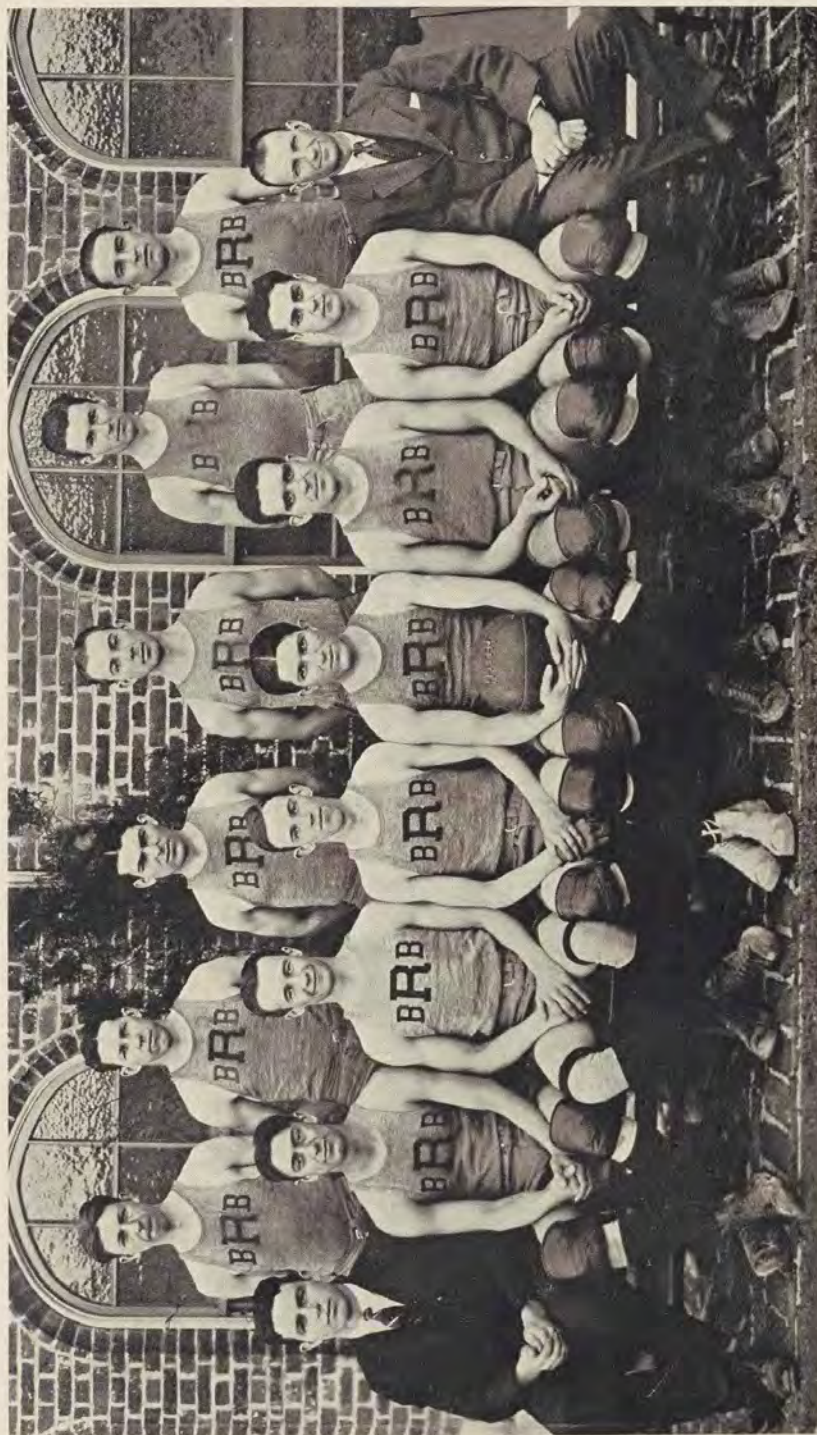

Basketball 1925

The first call for 1925 basketball found the Spiders facing the problem of replacing Fagan and Fray at forward and Bethel at guard. Coach Dobson had an abundance of material, but three men quickly forged to the van and ably filled in the vacancies. Herbert Peterson, former John Marshall High School star, earned his place as regular forward, making Bell an excellent running mate, and incidentally leading the team in season scoring with 130 points to his credit. Al Spose, a lad from New Haven, Connecticut, won the other guard berth and his floor work was the subject of comment all over the state. In "Rags" Ragozzino, another Connecticut native, Coach Dobson had one of the best utility men he has ever developed. "Rags" subbed in ten games, playing both center and forward.

By winning thirteen out of seventeen contests, the Spiders again won the state collegiate title and established themselves as one of the leading quints in the Old Dominion. Beginning with an easy victory over the Medical College, in which Captain Miller again faced Horace Hicks, former William and Mary star, who was the main cog in the Sawbone machine this year, the Spiders sustained the first of their four defeats when North Carolina State took their measure by a 22-14 count.

Doubling the score and more on Union Theological Seminary and the first Hampden Sidney encounter, the Red and Blue met their second defeat at the hands of Virginia's five, which again led the entire state. In this game, due to a new ruling by the Southern Conference which placed University of Richmond and William and Mary on a basis equal with conference members, Coach Dobson was not allowed to use any freshmen and Peterson and Spose, two regulars, were unable to play. Ragozzino came through in great style as a substitute, scoring five field goals for his mates.

Randolph Macon succumbed to the Spider attack, 33-20 and then came the thrilling 42-33 triumph over William and Mary before a crowd of more than 1,000 persons who jammed the new Milhiser Memorial Gymnasium to capacity.

A controversy over the eligibility of Hicks attached unusual interest to the return Medical College engagement, which the Spiders won, 44-32, with Hicks in the Sawbone lineup. Inability to cope with the old sleeping guard play caused the third Red and Blue disaster, Stevens Tech, from Hoboken, New Jersey, taking the local's scalp 24-17, in the former's first appearance on a Richmond Court.

On Feb. 2, Lynchburg snatched a one point victory in the closing minute of play in one of the hardest fought games of the season. The final count was 28-27, thanks to McMinn's winning basket for the Hill City lads.

Duke (formerly Trinity College), Randolph Macon and Hampden-Sidney were easy victims.

Lynchburg was defeated on her own court, 23-17 in the game that ultimately decided the state collegiate championship. Bridgewater, another strong contender, fell before the fast Dobson quint, 29-23.

By winning the return engagement with William and Mary, on the latter's court in the new George P. Blow Memorial Gymnasium, the University rung down the curtain on one of the most successful seasons in the history of the school. The Indians lost their second contest 27-26 in a bitterly fought battle.

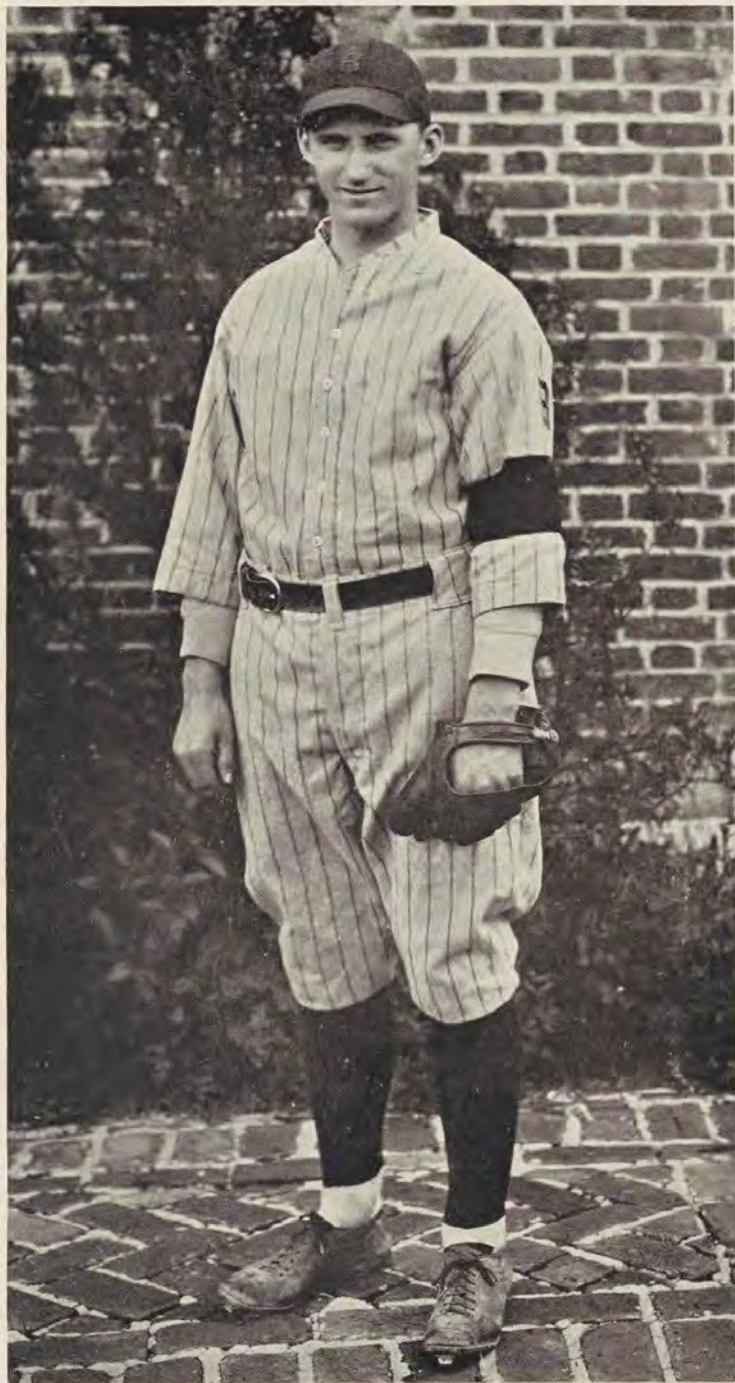
Captain Miller deserves praise for his leadership. In spite of his acknowledged ability to run up a high individual score, as evidenced by his 213 points made in 1924, Dave displayed splendid team work and even saw a freshman forward beat him out for scoring honors, when he could have undoubtedly run up his total at the expense of his mates.

DeMotte and Bell both showed improvement. The five man defense proved too much for most of their opponents and close guarding featured the season's work for the Spiders. That Coach Dobson developed a high powered five is indicated by the average of 31.8 points per game attained by the university cagers and the balance of the team is shown by the fact that three men scored over 100 points. Winning thirteen games and losing four gave the quint an average of .765 for the season. They won eight out of nine contests with other Virginia college teams for the state title and a percentage of .889.

Coach Dobson will not lose a single man by graduation, and barring unlooked for eventualities, the University of Richmond should have another sterling outfit in 1926.

Baseball 1924

For the second time in as many years the Spider Baseball team won the inter-collegiate championship of Virginia. Roanoke and Richmond were the chief contenders, but it was generally conceded that the Spiders had the edge over the Maroons. Of the twelve games played against Virginia teams the Red and Blue club won ten, an enviable record indeed. Victories were scored over Washington and Lee, V. M. I., King, William and Mary twice, Randolph-Macon three times, Medical College and Seminary.

Curt Fray, captain of the team, was probably the outstanding player. Besides being the best lead off man in the state he was a fine hitter and base runner. In addition his fielding was exceptional.

Walden, Cook and Sam Creath made up an exceptional outfield. All were good fielders and strong hitters.

Until the untimely death by drowning in the Westhampton Lake, Walter Bixby was showing up fine at second base. The future held forth wonderful prospects for him, both as a man and as an athlete. His loss was keenly felt both by the squad and the entire student body. Fred Cook, captain elect, succeeded him at second base and very ably held down the position.

The Spider infield was exceptionally strong. Dave Miller at first base, Bixby and later Cook at second base, Captain Fray at short stop and A. Creath at third base made up a quartet hard to equal. Probably no team in the state could boast of such an infield.

The batteries were also strong, although the pitching staff was lacking in numbers. This fact merely gives more credit to Johnson and L. Minter. Both pitched excellent ball. Henry Johnson won from V. M. I. and twice from William and Mary while Minter won from Washington and Lee. Savory showed up well behind the bat. The prospects for the 1925 squad are encouraging. The outfield will remain intact while only Fray will be lost in the infield. Johnson's pitching will be missed. But to counteract these losses the team will be composed practically entirely of men playing their third year on the Red and Blue squad.

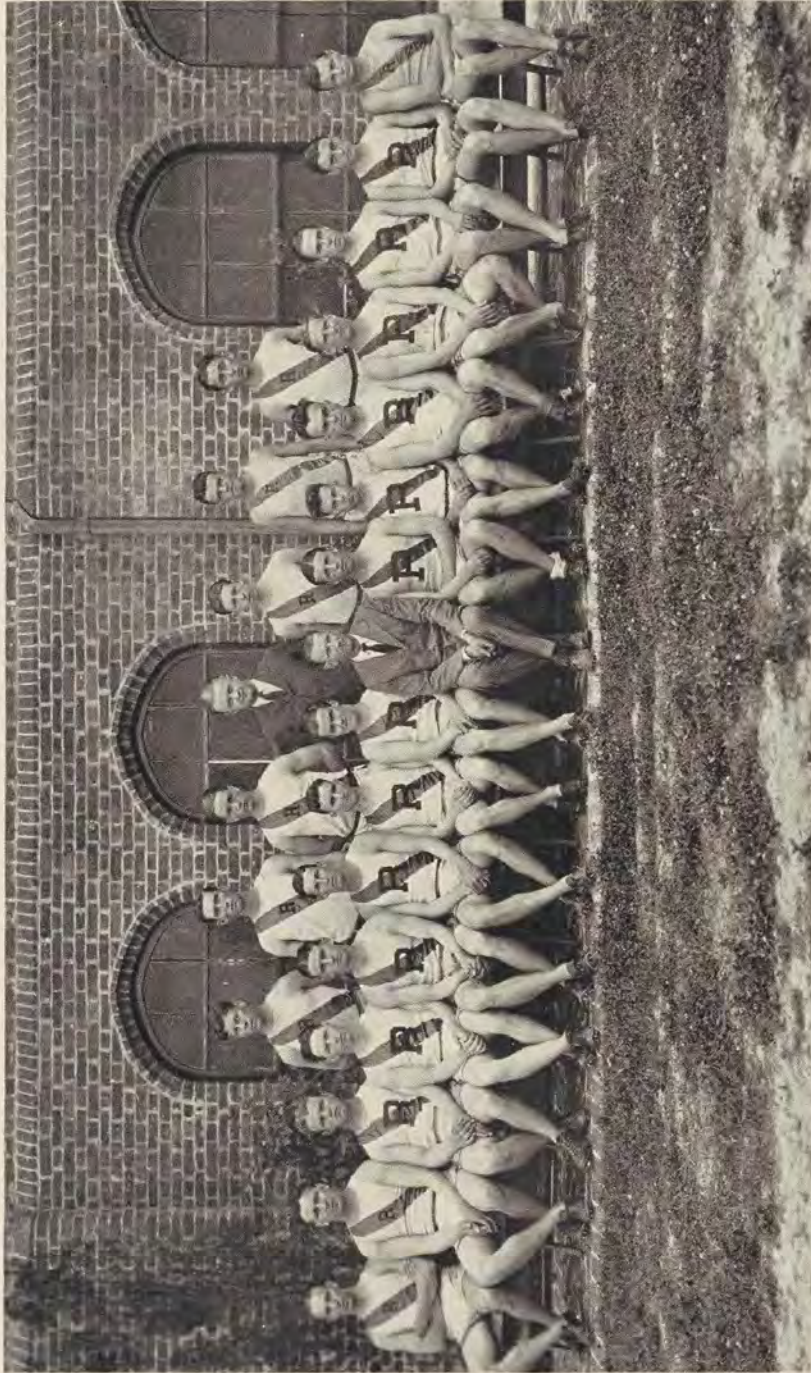

Track and Field

While football in 1924 was far from successful, judged from the standpoint of games won and lost, track and field athletics were just the opposite. Of the six dual meets, five resulted in victories for the Spiders while in the one triangular meet and in the Virginia-North Carolina meet, the University of Richmond squad was victorious by a very healthy margin. Likewise the indoor team was just as victorious, walking away with honors in all encounters.

The relay team composed of Bloxom, Edwards, Goode and Tharpe not only won the mile relay at the Baltimore games, but also established a new college record for the mile. In the Georgetown indoor games the Spiders also carried off the honors in the mile relay. Twice was the William and Mary relay team defeated.

Considering the outdoor track and field season one cannot help but be impressed at the wonderful results accomplished by the U. of R. squad. Washington and Lee was the only team encountered which managed to defeat the Spiders—and that defeat by a thirty point margin. But it was only two years ago when the Generals defeated the Spiders by something like a hundred points. The progress made in the past two years as indicated by the two meets is in itself something of which to be justly proud. Wake Forest, Trinity and William and Mary proved to be easy, the Spiders piling up in the three meets a total of 263½ points against their combined 103½. The Maryland meet proved to be the closest of the season, Richmond winning by six points. The V. P. I. meet was called after the Spiders had taken two out of the three places in the shot-put on account of rain. And it was in the weight events that the Spiders were weakest.

Both the triangular and Virginia-North Carolina meets were easy victories for the Red and Blue. In the former the Spiders made almost four times as many points as the combined totals of the others. In the latter, Richmond won the meet by a margin of nearly forty points.

Never before has Richmond turned out such an impressive track and field team. Twelve men won the coveted "R," a heretofore unparalleled number. Of these twelve men, exactly half will not be in college in 1924-1925.

That the Public May Know!

It has long been a conviction of the students that many of the ideas which they laborously evolve come to naught, because they are side-tracked by scheming faculty advisors or suppressed by unsympathetic deans or lost (intentionally?) in the files of the president's or vice-president's office. This suspicion has recently been confirmed by the finding of a document which was evidently designed to influence trustee action, but which quite as evidently never reached the men to whom it was addressed. That this document climbed the various administrative steps prescribed for ascent to our final board of authority is evidenced by the marginal notes in chirographies so familiar that the authorship is betrayed. We suppress these notes! Emanating as they do from the persons mentioned in the final paragraph of the quoted document, they can have been actuated by no worthy motive! Rather, they betray jealousy of more fortunate colleagues and personal pique at a fancied slight. The document itself, however, we print in full:

To the Trustees of the University of Richmond:—

Dear Sirs:—

Immediately after the last Faculty Meeting at Westhampton College the officers of the Senior class of Westhampton College received, as is customary, the detailed report of their regular committee whose function it is to "listen in" to all faculty conversations and discussions. - A. Degrees to be conferred by the University.
- B. Commissions to be executed by the professors.
- C. Memorials to be erected.

A. In this group we suggest:

1. That leave of absence from the dormitory from 4 A. M. to 6 A. M. during the Spring term be granted Dr. Landrum so that she may complete her statistical survey of the campus birds; and that at the approaching commencement she receive the degree of M.A., signifying "Magistra Avium."
2. That, in recognition of assistance frequently rendered to a colleague in the matter of a certain costume, Miss Isabel Harris be given her choice of two degrees, C.G. and I. J. G. F., the former signifying, "Costumer to her Grace", and the latter signifying, "Inductor into the Jade Green Frock."
3. That to Miss Emily Brown, who has labored so unsuccessfully to create a school of original drama, there be given the degree of B.F., signifying, "Bosses of Freedley."

B. Under "Commissions to be executed by the professors we suggest":

1. That an international commission be appointed, consisting of Dr. Mitchell, Dr. Lough, Dr. Harlan, Dr. Meredith, Mr. Hayden and Mr. Merriman, to solve all present and future international problems, the assignments to be as follows:
Dr. Mitchell to put the United States into the League of Nations.

Dr. Lough to settle all Irish complications.

Dr. Harlan to quiet all social unrest.

Dr. Meredith to act as interpreter.

Mr. Hayden to isolate and confine every germ now flourishing in Europe.

Mr. Merriman to catalogue the flora of the Eastern hemisphere.

2. That Miss Woodfin be commissioned to invent an ambidextrous system of note-taking so that her copy of all documents in the State Library may the sooner be completed.
 3. That Miss Louise Withers invent a study lamp which shall generate electricity by consuming it, so that her mid-night study may be pursued without undue strain on the university lighting plant.
 4. That in recognition of Dr. Loving's long and faithful service he be directed to install at his own expense an "Electric-Esculator—Not Osculator"—running from his residence to the science hall and thence up to Westhampton College; the same to be at the disposal of Dr. Harris when he needs to meet a Greek class at Westhampton. Saturday, October 25.

We've been getting fat! Judy expressed a very veracious truth today. You see we both got D on P. and H. We'd sworn off bread 'cause we learned in P. and H. that it made you fat. Judy came in and plumped in the seat (her hair's red and she fumes!). "Gimme some bread." "Why Judy" I admonished, "bread'll make you fat!" "Pass the bread" she said grimly. "There seems to be only one thing I can do successfully and that's to get fat." I ate six slices of bread and jam. But I'm worried about the family and the report. Betty, the mean Soph, asked me if I'd gotten an invite to the yellow tea party. I answered "No, who gives it?" She said the faculty gave it, and I was wandering if my brown silk would do when Dolly (she's my senior mother) said, "That's not nice, you were a Rat once yourself, have a heart. I do want to get married—and I must stick out four years of college, so I can have dates in the Senior den on Sunday night. There's always a problem of some sort confronting one.

We saw a lot of men on Broad Street who haven't read all the amendments to the constitution.

We played a football game too, but we didn't beat.

Sunday, December 7.

We had a Golden Rule dinner to-day. Golden apricots for the piece de resistance. Golden cheese, too. It wasn't so bad tho'—and everybody experienced a sort of virtuous glow over it.

Friday, December 12.

Jimmy's a dear; gave me a bid to his frat's dance. The Dean didn't approve of Rats going 'specially when Judy and I happened to have a D, but we managed to get permission. I had the most wonderful time; wore my orchid taffeta dress, and Jimmy said I looked like a true nuff orchid. I adore the way he dances. I'm beginning to think perhaps all Westhampton girls don't become old maids. His frat brothers were darling to me, but just nearly died over the "Ducks". I'll never hear the end of that. Mrs. Black started for home the minute we got there, and we started at 11:30. I'm just one big pink thrill and feel that after all my college life will be a success.

December 12. Odd Day.

Today the Odds had an odd celebration. They were supposed to have a hockey game between the faculty and the Social Hockey Team, but it rained and they played a basketball game instead. Miss Crenshaw was very clever and called fouls on the social Basketball for resisting the Faculty. The Faculty won 'cause Mrs. Groves shot a goal in her opponent's basket! To-night the Odds all dressed in Chinese suits, and ate rice and almond cakes together. Some of the suits were rather suspicious looking, but they managed to carry it off with a bravado. It was *Odd*. Pajamas are often worn to breakfast, but that was the first time I've seen them at dinner. The tree ceremony was impressive, even if it did rain—that was the only thing about the day that wasn't odd—it raining. Afterwards the Odds had a little pageant—Chinese—in which they gave the Odd spirit to the progeny. Democracy reigned triumphant! Then they sang beautifully to us Evens, making an ODD in the hockey field with lanterns. I went to the Lyric this afternoon with a bunch of girls. We saw a lot of Richmond College boys. I didn't think the show was so very good. One girl with too many chins, and

another, who should have sold her photograph to the Pepsodent people, sang a lot of songs we had in the High School minstrel last year.

I liked an acrobatic stunt a man and a woman did; you'd have to hand it to him, his semi-circular canals were all right. Dolly worries me. She sometimes talks in a language I can't understand.

There was one joke that appealed to me. One nigger said to another, "What would you do if you wuz to get a letter from the K. K. K.?" The other said, "I'd read it on the train." That gives me an idea about letters from the Student Government Association.



Sunday, January 25.

Another Sunday, but today wasn't as blue as they usually are. Had lots of fun watching the Sunday dates. All the frats came in delegations and grabbed their girls, or other people's girls and politely disappeared, but the PIKS came late and either from disinclination or lateness failed to get any girls, so they parked on the barrier right under our room. We'd been making candy and it was good! Judy and I were peeking out the window at the line-up when John Tatum, that adorable Collegian writer, started to slip backward. His expression changed from one of lazy serenity to blank astonishment, the way the baby looks when the candy turns out to be medicine. I was

nearly convulsed while Judy tried hard to save him from a fall by grabbing at the air twenty feet above his head. But alas for all her concentration, he, dignified John disappeared over the wall, leaving two legs with feet attached sticking in the air. Judy, always thinking of the clever thing at the right moment, audibly whispered as soon as he righted himself, "Ah, do it again!" This illustrious member of the Cherry Club turned the color of his patron fruit, casting a peculiar glance at our window. So we decreed to pay him for the show and wrapped up a piece of candy in an envelope labelled "John Tatum—prize acrobat" and threw it to him. Then he grinned like a cheshire cat; and began to nibble very slowly at the hunk of fudge. Jimmie had already asked me, so we had a time introducing, and watching the bashful advances of the Richmond College swains. After ice cream and cake, which Judy missed, poor dear—she had a date with a Randolph Macon boy last Sunday which resulted in a date with S. G. during the party,—we returned home to find our rooms carefully fixed by the Sophs. Good it was Saturday—Miss Waples doesn't come around on Saturday.

February 6, '25.

Judy and I went to that cute party the Juniors gave the Freshmen tonight. It was a theatre party—in the Red Cross Building—because they couldn't get the *National*. The Juniors sent us the little theatre tickets and ushers in High School cadet uniforms "sewed us to the sheets." You know how crazy those Juniors can be when they don't try, which they did do and that made them funnier! There were four acts in the show, which varied from an Eskie-play with counterpanes over chairs for ice burgs to a most soulful rendering of "Poor Flutter-by."

Well, the eats were *tres bien!* We had more food than you could "shake a stick at," chicken salad sandwiches, nuts, ice cream and cakes, red and white heart mints, I believe, but I ate so much I couldn't even talk when they came around.

We danced too. Some boys played—and I danced three times with my "crush". Thrills! She wasn't my "crush" when I went 'cause I always thought she was "stuck up" before. You know that kind of stuck up Mr. Astrop could tell a joke about.

We almost got lost coming home when we tried to walk around the hockey field with our eyes shut, but I always do feel comfortable when I think of that boy who took Judy to the Rat Banquet. He is the one who got lost trying to follow the road signs to *Detour*.

May 1. *"Today dawned not upon the earth as other days have done
A throng of little virgin clouds stood waiting for the sun".*

Today was May Day! We Rats got up early and carried May baskets to our respected Senior mothers (respected is such a pretty word I think, so much nicer than just "our" unmodified). Mine was a pink lady slipper all by itself in an old-fashioned lace collar. I hope she likes it. Then we listened to the Seniors singing *Welcome Sweet Springtime* and just died to see who the May Queen was. It was that adorable Senior mother of mine. I knew she'd get it. I voted for her! All day long we rushed and worked, getting trees and costumes and practicing bud dances under the trees. I really felt sorry for the buds; they came out a little too early for their abbreviated costumes. The May Day exercises! How can I describe them. All my English 1 training and vocabulary note books scarcely give me words to express such a cute ceremony. Everybody and everything was gorgeous, especially that dear queen and the dancers.

Then came the crowning event—Lantern Night—when we climbed the hill singing "Neath Westhampton Pines" and carried lighted lanterns. Then we sang new songs and old in the court; our white dresses shining in the glamorous candle light—

*"May our efforts ever be a firm endeavor
Always to be true to you!"*



May 16th, 1925.

The Minstrel was a scream! I've never laughed so much, not even at convocation when Dr. Ryland stood in the center of the aisle and looked for the world like a glorified traffic cop, dressed in all those Ph. D. trappings of his.

I wonder if, when I get my Ph. D. in Latin, I'll be such a good sport about jokes pulled, as Miss Beggs and the rest are? Well, I won't worry about it till I pass Latin 1.

The dances were funny too. Ever since I fell in that May Day dance, I've enjoyed seeing other people make fools of themselves to music.

I bet the interlocutor felt comfortable. Everybody else, including the end men, was miserable most of the time. The suspense was terrible! When they'd get such a big laugh that it almost shook the basketball goal down, I always told myself, "Better laugh at this one; the next may be on you." To start the year of 1923-24, we assumed responsibility for the production of the Baptist Historical Pageant at the City Auditorium, which was given to a more than capacity audience. After that the University Players assisted in the production of the three performances of "Alice Sit-by-the-Fire," for which can be claimed true success. We then turned to reorganization and under Miss Emily Brown's farsighted guidance we emerged one in purpose, in place of the divided aims of the past. We set forth with new interest in our dramatic endeavors.

The first plays, after this change, to be presented were Lady Gregory's "The Rising of the Moon," directed by Susie Blair, and Louise Saunder's "The Knave of Hearts," under the direction of George Freedley. The plays proved excellent for the development of new material. We next attempted Wilde's "The Importance of Being Ernest", that paradoxical satire on satires. "Twelfth Night" was produced out-of-doors and concluded a highly successful year in dramatics under the brilliant direction of Miss Brown.

The present session of 1924-25 was opened dramatically by a bill of one-act plays in the Fall Term. Charles McDaniel directed Rostand's "The Romancers" and Shaw's "Overruled" was produced by Cabell Phillips, our president. These were highly praised by a large audience gathered in the Red Cross House. The players conducted the revival of "Fashion", presented by the Senior Classes, at the Academy of Music. Competent critics have adjusted this our most successful effort in the annals of our dramatic history, which was made possible by the remarkable direction of Miss Emily Brown, and the admirable handling of the artistic efforts in this as in all our plays by Marion Marsh and Moyer Mahaney.

Our next presentations will be before the Student Government Associations of the colleges in March. This sparkling comedy will be followed by an experimental bill of one-act plays the middle of April, including possibly some of the work of our own college dramatists. A costume play out of doors will be as usual our offering in June. While too early to forecast, we hope this to be our finest year in dramatics. Whatever praise may be ours, we feel that the majority of it is due to the presence of our delicious and inimitable director, Miss Emily Brown.
