February 2, 1996, 8:15 PM Byrd and William Perkinson Recital Hall Neal Ramsay has taken his saxophone from the dance hall to the concert hall. His ability to cross musical boundaries and to push his instrument into new arenas has resulted in national tours, recordings, and performances in some of America's most prestigious concert halls. "In Ramsay's hands the saxophone may have finally received its vital spark." (Chicago Sun-Times)

In a continuing effort to expand the saxophone's repertoire, Neal has composed, commissioned, unearthed, adapted and arranged a multitude of works. His concerts feature an eclectic repertoire that embraces many genres, including classical, jazz, popular and folk. Neal coined the term "Classy music," to describe his choice of material. "Mr. Ramsay's selections were fresh and listenable. They combined the best elements of old and new. This is music with class, something that you want to hear again and again." (The Tennesseean)

Neal Ramsay has toured the United States six times. He has given sold-out concerts at the John F. Kennedy Center and Carnegie Hall including his own three-concert Carnegie Hall Series that celebrated the 150th anniversary of the saxophone's invention. He has performed with such show business greats as Bob Hope, Dionne Warwick, Paul McCartney, "Dizzy" Gillespie and Ella Fitzgerald. Neal has appeared on CBS Sunday Morning, and Walt Disney Productions. His radio credits include Voice of America, NPR"S All Things Considered, Morning Edition and Weekend Edition and Garrison Keillor's A Prairie Home Companion and American Radio Theater of the Air.

One of the few individuals to be awarded two soloist grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Neal is also the winner of the Kansas City Young Artist competition. He received the Outstanding Achievement Award from the former Secretary of Education, Lamar Alexander, in recognition of his concerts in the schools. His discography contains six solo albums including Saxophone Alone, Four Moods, Point of Departure, Pictures and Other Exhibitions, Sax 5th Ave. And NewStream Christmas. Neal contributes works for the saxophone through Shawnee Press, Medici Music and Dorn Publications. His articles have appeared in International Musician, The Instrumentalist, and The Saxophone Journal.

One of Neal Ramsay's trademarks is his tone quality. The Boston Globe described it as "covering a range from flute-like to that of a gutsy cello but always with crystal clarity." He attributes his sound, in part, to his own reed design and mouthpieces made for him by master craftsman David Hite. He is also an advisor and clinician for the Yamaha and Vandoren Corporations.

In his junior year of high school he took up the saxophone after hearing a television broadcast of saxophonist Vincent J. Abato. Abato was featured as soloist with the New York Philharmonic playing Alexander Glazounov's Concerto in E-flat. "I was so moved by Abato's playing that I called him in New York the next day and asked how I should get started. He helped me realize the saxophone's potential." Neal is a graduate of George Peabody College and The University of North Texas. He also has studied with conductor/oboist Mitch Miller and ultimately Vincent Abato, his original inspiration.
