NOTES

This concert is presented in conjunction with the Haiku Society of America Annual Meeting at the University of Richmond. Haiku poems consist of three lines, comprising a total of seventeen syllables: five-seven-five.

In Elliot Schwartz's *Four Maine Haiku*, the twelve chromatic pitches are divided into a group of five pitches, a group of four, and a group of three. Each movement consists of seventeen measures using a pre-determined succession of the pitch groups.

Elliot Schwartz is Professor of Music at Bowdoin College.

Robert Gibson's *Four Haiku* is "an attempt at a musical parallel, although there is no fixed number of pitches or rhythms which governs the structure. It is the sense of completeness in a short period of time that I wished to achieve in the musical 'translation.' Each of the poems suggests a season, and taken together they comprise a miniature cycle."

Robert Gibson is Associate Professor of Music at the University of Maryland.

Mel Powell taught at Yale University and became Dean of the school of music at the California Institute of the Arts in 1969. He was an accomplished jazz pianist as well as a highly respected composer using 12-tone technique. In the *Haiku Settings*, he uses interval relations derived from pitch sets to frame the subtle lyricism of the vocal line.
