

The result was a diverse pool of talent with singers from various departments of the universities, from many studios in Richmond, one student from the Open High School, one who comes weekly from Staunton, Virginia and who teaches at Mary Baldwin College. We have had one class each week this semester, meeting on each campus alternately.

In addition to offering the opportunity to study and work with Artist-in-Residence Richard Harrell we have been able to offer a Master Class for the accompanying of opera taught by Guest Artist William Huckaby.

Richard Harrell, a native of Oklahoma, received his Bachelor of Music degree from Catholic University in 1976. After serving as an Apprentice Artist at the Sante Fe Opera in 1977, he moved to New York City to study opera with a full scholarship at Manhattan School of Music. There he received international recognition in the New York premiere of Hindemith's opera News of the Day as the leading baritone. In 1980 he served as assistant director of the opera department.

Harrell has made regular appearances with the Fort Worth Opera, the Opera/Omaha, and the Baltimore Opera. Concert appearances include singing with the National Symphony Orchestra, the Oratorio Society of Washington, and a recital at the Smithsonian Institution.

Drama has always been an equal partner with music in the development of Mr. Harrell's career. While a music major and drama minor in college, he studied for three years at the Washington Theatre Laboratory under Anthony Abeson, a former member of Jerzy Grotowski's famous Polish Theatre Laboratory.

Recent seasons have been devoted to the work of Leonard Bernstein. After performing in Bernstein's newest opera A Quiet Place at La Scala, Richard recorded the role of Bernardo on the new Deutsche Grammophon album of West Side Story, with Bernstein conducting. Following the recording, he went to the Baltimore Opera to sing the role of Maximillian in Candide, and then last spring he again performed A Quiet Place at the Vienna State Opera. Harrell is the Artistic Director of a new performing arts festival in central Vermont, the Mad River Festival Theatre, for which Leonard Bernstein serves as Chairman of the Advisory Council. This spring in addition to his work here, he appeared in West Side Story in Wheeling, West Virginia, and in Benjamin Britten's Albert Herring performed in Little Rock, Arkansas, (George Manahan conducting).

William Huckaby's versatile career has included 25 years as a coach and accompanist as well as choral director and conductor of musical theater. He has toured extensively in the United States and in Europe and can currently be heard on five recordings of American vocal music. Summers find Mr. Huckaby conducting the AIMS Orchestra in Graz, Austria. He is affiliated with the Minneapolis Opera, Opera of Boston, and the San Francisco Opera. In San Francisco he is music director of Western Opera Theater. This past season he appeared in recital at the Virginia Museum Theater with baritone William Parker. Huckaby recently conducted a benefit concert for the Orlando Opera with Metropolitan Opera baritone Sherrill Milnes. Mr. Huckaby is a regular conductor of the Orlando Opera. Recitals at major halls fill out his busy career.
