Radoslav Kvapil, piano

March 23, 1994, 8:15 PM North Court Recital Hall *Radoslav Kvapil* is considered by many international critics to be the most important Czech pianist and the finest exponent of Czech piano music. He has specialized in the performance of the Czech repertoire worldwide for over 20 years. His knowledge and understanding of these works remain unrivalled.

In 1967-69, he recorded Antonín Dvořák's complete piano works (Supraphon) for the first time in history, and this recording remains the only one of its kind. During the same period, he recorded the complete piano works of Leoš Janáček for Panton label. This was followed by a recording of the complete works of J.H. Voříšek (Supraphon) in 1975. A second complete recording of Leoš Janáček's piano works followed in 1989 (Adda/Paris), and in 1990, the first two volumes of Bohuslav Martinů's complete piano works were released by Adda. In 1993 Unicom-Kanchana Records released the first volumes of Kvapil's comprehensive anthology of Czech piano music: Dvořák, Smetana, Martinů, Voříšek. These will be followed by major works of other important Czech composers.

Radoslav Kvapil has performed for many years in major festivals and concert halls including the Royal Albert Hall (London), the Barbican (London), Carnegie Hall (New York), and the Théatre des Champs Elysées (Paris), as well as for radio and television networks in Europe, the United States and Japan.
