He received his Bachelor of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, his Master of Music in woodwinds from the University of Michigan, and his Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Temple University, where he directed the Supersax Ensemble and the Temple University Jazz Ensemble. Dr. Pfenninger's performance background includes touring the United States and Canada with various jazz and show groups, including opening acts for the Righteous Brothers, the Supremes, and the Temptations. He has recorded on the T.O.G. label as a featured soloist with several jazz fusion groups, and recently completed a recording project for the National Geographic television series playing flute and clarinet as well as tenor, alto, and soprano saxophone. Dr. Pfenninger is currently working on a series of books for the development of beginning improvisation skills. He is an active clinician on MIDI and computer-based music composition.

Michael Davison currently teaches jazz, trumpet, and music education at the University of Richmond. He holds a B.M.E. Degree from Eastman School of Music, a M.S.T. Degree from the University of Wisconsin, Whitewater and a D.M.A. Degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has performed as a member of the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater faculty brass quintet, Milwaukee Ballet, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Wisconsin Symphony Orchestra and Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra. In addition, Dr. Davison has performed with such artists as Michael Brecker, Chris Vadala, Gene Bertoncini, Curtis Fuller, the Temptations and both the Canadian and Empire Brass Ouintets. Dr. Davison has recorded five albums in the last five years: four with his own original jazz fusion combo, Late 4 Breakfast and one with the Dobbins/Billoud Big Band in France. Professor Davison is in the process of publishing a series of volumes on the transcriptions of trumpeter Randy Brecker with Hal Leonard Publishing Co., and has published original jazz combo compositions with Advanced Music Co., in Glendale, California. During the summer, Dr. Davison is on the faculty at the National Arts Camp in Interlochen, Michigan. He is in great demand throughout the country as a classical and jazz teacher and performer, and is also sought after as a performer and clinician on the Akai Electronic Valve Instrument.

Russell Wilson, a native of Memphis, Tennessee, is an outstanding classical and jazz pianist who was graduated from Memphis State University where he received his bachelor and master of music degrees. Formerly a member of Virginia Union University's music faculty, he now teaches at the University of Richmond and at Virginia Commonwealth University. He performs regularly with the Russell Wilson Quartet and Joe Kennedy Quartet. Mr. Wilson enjoys a distinguished career as a solo and chamber music performer. Currently, he is the principal pianist of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra and the Richmond Sinfonia, where he has performed as a soloist. With the Orchestra, he has accompanied world class artists including Mel Torme, Richard Hyman, Cab Calloway, Chet Atkins, Steve Allen, and Carol Lawrence. Mr. Wilson's performances over the years have been numerous and varied: as pianist with the Joe Kennedy Quartet at the 1987 National Association of Jazz Educators Conference in Atlanta; with the Louisville Symphony Orchestra as accompanist for flautist Leslie Burrs; at the Smithsonian Institution as pianist with Trio Pro Viva, a chamber ensemble devoted to the performance of music by Black composers; as the featured soloist performing Beethoven's Concerto No. 1 in C major with the Petersburg Symphony Orchestra; and as the featured soloist with the New River Valley Symphony and the Richmond Symphony performing Duke Ellington's New World a' Comin.' Mr. Wilson was selected to perform in master classes conducted by Earl Wild and Leon Fleisher. Additionally, he, along with his trio, conducts improvisational workshops. His first recording, Moonlight Piano, recently was released.

Jocko MacNelly is the author of an instructional method for electric bass titled The Electric Bass Book. He has recently completed his master's degree at University of Virginia. He is teaching at the University of Richmond, teaching privately, and playing bass in the Richmond-based ten-piece band, Spectrum. Mr. MacNelly has performed with the Richmond Symphony and the Richmond Sinfonia, and with the recording group House of Freaks. He has also played bass with the Heath Brothers, Billy Eckstine, Lou Donaldson, and Steve Bassett.
